

Charles II, (1660-1685). Large silver medal commemorating King Charles landing at Dover in 1660. The start of the restoration of the Stuart monarchy. Diam. 57mm. Edge: plain. Legend in Latin "If God is my keeper who shall be my enemy". Obverse features a finely executed bust of the monarch by famed coinage artist John Roettiers. The portrait of the King has long hair, drapery around the shoulders, a large cravat bow and insignia, all enclosed within branches of laurel formed into an elaborate circle. Upper legend reads: DEUM. PROVIDENTIA. ATQ. MISERICORDIA. VIVO ('I live by the providence and mercy of God'). Lower legend reads: ANNO. RESERATAE. SALUTIS. 1660. DIE. 29. MAII ('In the year of renewed safety. 1660. 29 May') Below is the small neat monogram of Roettier. Outer legend: CAROLUS. II. D. G. MAGN: BRITANN: FRANC: ET. HIBERN: REX:, Reverse shows a ship approaching the coast where 3 warriors (representing England, Scotland and Ireland) await its arrival. Symbolically, in the distance a young oak tree grows from the remains of an old one. The eye of providence beams over the whole scene, (MI i, p. 457 no. 48. Eimer 211). Toned, die crack across head, otherwise extremely fine or better, rare.

This is a remarkably beautiful, historically important and well preserved medal. The crisp detail is complemented by a subtle original green/gold patina. Probably the first medal executed by Roettier in Britain. John and Joseph Roettiers went on to engrave the dies for the new 'Guinea' coinage. This may be the finest available example of this rare medal.

Although this remarkable medal is undated, it is assumed that it celebrates the King's Declaration of Liberty of Conscience, which was dated 15th March 1672. There had been a fear in England that continuing wars against the Dutch were simply an excuse for the King to reintroduce rule without Parliament and Catholicism. The Declaration of March 1672 suspended restrictions on Catholics and Protestant dissenters, but the effect was to confirm in the public's minds the association of arbitrary government, Catholicism and an unpopular foreign policy. As the war foundered, Parliament forced the King to withdraw the declaration and in its place they enacted the anti-Catholic Test Act in 1673 which banned Catholics from holding many positions of power. Although those who had signed his father's death warrant were punished (9 regicides were put to death) and Cromwell's body was exhumed from Westminster and put in a common plot, Charles II pursued a policy of political tolerance and power sharing. His attempts to promote greater religious tolerance were met with suspicion. He was however a charismatic pragmatist who successfully walked a tightrope during his 25 year reign and notably only became a Catholic on his deathbed in 1685. Medallic Illustrations of British History states: `This medal is very beautiful, though the figure on the reverse is somewhat clumsy and ungraceful.' But it should be noted that the features of the lady are never well struck up on this particular medal - probably because this area of the reverse design corresponds with the most raised area of the King's head on the obverse, but one could not hope to find a better preserved example of this rare, handsome and numismatically fascinating medal.



Charles II, Christ's Hospital, Mathematical Medal, 1673, in silver (57mm) by John Roettiers from dies now housed in the British Museum. Probably a medal given to a few star pupils and dignitaries after the foundation of the Royal Mathematical School in Christ's Hospital (School). Obverse features a laureate pointed bust of the King with long hair and no drapery. This is a larger and more detailed version of Roettier's spectacular `Guinea head' which graces the early gold coinage of Charles II. Obverse legend reads: CAROLVS. SECVNDVS. DEI. GRATIA. MAG. BRI. FRAN. ET. HIB. REX., Reverse shows a mathematical diagram which appears to give the rule for determining the point of the ravelin (a triangular fortification or detached outwork) in front of the bastions of a fortress, (Eimer -, MI i, 559/221). Bright, extremely fine or better and rare.

Sir Jonas Moore was Master Surveyor of His Majesty's Ordinance in this period. He was also a Governor of Christ's Hospital school, and it is believed that under his influence the Royal Charter was granted by the King for the foundation of the Mathematical School. It is believed that he was instrumental in the production of this medal. During the reign of Charles II science and scientific pursuits flourished. Sir Christopher Wren (1623-1732) made important contributions in the fields of architecture, physics and mathematics. Encouraged by the King, Sir Isaac Newton (1643-1727) was a pioneer in mechanics, astronomy, alchemy and philosophy. The arts and sciences combined to form something of a golden age of learning.

James II,(1685-1688). Silver medal featuring Archbishop Sancroft and the seven bishops by George Bower. 51 mm diameter. Raised edge lettering. Obverse has a bust of Sancroft facing right wearing a cap and religious robing. Reverse features six medallions with cameo portraits of the imprisoned bishops, around that of the Bishop of London. This pleasantly toned piece is a significantly better preserved medal than most of the other specimens which appear in the marketplace. James II became King on the death of his brother Charles II in 1685. James did not have the tact or diplomatic prowess of Charles and soon began to force his religious views on a sceptical nation. In 1687 he issued the Declaration of Indulgence, also known as the Declaration for Liberty of Conscience in which he used his suspending powers to negate the effects of laws punishing Roman Catholics and Protestant dissenters. James ordered the Declaration to be read from the pulpits of every Anglican church - further alienating the bishops. Later, in 1688, when the Archbishop of Canterbury (William Sancroft) and 6 other bishops submitted a petition asking for the reconsideration of the King's religious policies they were arrested, placed in the Tower of London and tried for seditious libel. They were later brought before the Court of King's Bench and found not guilty. The famous episode - one of the key events in British history - led to the beginning of the end of the reign of James II and his replacement by his daughter and son-in-law, William II and Mary II. The right to petition the King, as the bishops had done, became enshrined in the new Bill of Rights introduced in 1689.





Mary II, (1688-1694) Large silver medal struck upon the death of Queen Mary 1694, Diam. 60mm. Edge plain. Obverse, bust of Mary II facing right (wearing tiara with hair bound by strings of pearls) by I. Boskam (Jan Boskam). Reverse, a monument of three gradations, decorated with a detailed scene representing the royal funeral procession. Seated above are the three fates: Clotho presides over Mary's birth, Lachesis with a spindle twists her threads of life, and Atropos with scissors cuts the thread in two when her life has run its course. The legend above is: VNICA DIGNO DEO ('Worthy alone of God') and in small letters below: VIVIT. POST. FVNERA. VIRTVS. MDCXCV (Virtue survives the tomb,) The date of 1695 is based on the old calendar. This is a wonderfully well preserved and very rare medal with a deep blue/grey patination. One is accustomed to seeing the conjoined busts of William (III) and Mary (II) as joint monarchs, and a large silver piece such as this is difficult to obtain. This medal is much rarer than the coins of this celebrated monarch. (MI p. 114, No. 349, Eimer -). Toned, extremely fine or better.

Mary II died quickly and unexpectedly at the relatively young age of 32, at the very end of 1694. In mid-December 1694 she fell ill, and distict characteristics of smallpox were diagnosed. Within days her death was announced to a shocked nation. Burnet said 'Never was such a face of universal sorrow seen in a court or in a town. All people, men and women, young and old could scarce refrain from tears.' William III, devoted husband of Mary, continued alone as monarch until his death in 1702 following a serious fall from his horse. From the time that Mary's illness accelerated, the King hardly ever left her bedchamber, and after her death, he was apparently so overcome with grief that he would often collapse. For some weeks he was unable to attend to the affairs of state and did not venture into public places.

Anne, Queen Anne's Bounty, 1704, in silver (45mm) by John Crocker, Obverse: Laureate bust of the Queen facing left, with lovelocks behind and on the right shoulder. The Queen is wearing an elaborate gown. At the edge of the mantle are the initials I.C. for John Crocker. Reverse: Anne is seated on her throne, presenting a charter to her clergy who are kneeling before her. The legend reads PIETAS AVGVSTAE ('The Piety of the Queen'), (Eimer 404, MI ii, 251-2/43). *Toned, extremely fine or better and scarce.*

After the Reformation, King Henry VIII had transferred the right to levy certain taxes upon the clergy from the Pope to the crown. Anne determined to give back much of the revenue so derived in the form of a fund established to help the clergy at local levels. This fund is now known by the name `Queen Anne's Bounty'. Although this medal does 'turn up' it is seldom seen in this excellent state of preservation. This piece has a superb deep old green grey tone over almost flawless surfaces.



Anne, (1702-1714), Large silver medal 1707 by John Crocker celebrating the Union of England and Wales. Obverse: Crowned and draped bust of Queen facing left wearing gown decorated with pearls, mantle and collar. 70mm. Legend: ANNA.DEI.GRATIA.MAG.BRITAN.FRA.ET.HIB. REGINA. Reverse: a statue of the Queen as Pallas bearing a spear and a shield. The significance is that Anne is depicted as the Palladium or defence of the newly unified Kingdom, (Eimer 423, MI ii, 298/115). *Toned, extremely fine or better and scarce.*

George III, (1760-1820) Silver medal (54mm diam) commemorating the death of Charles James Fox. Obverse: Draped bust of Fox (by medallist and coinage designer Webb) facing right, with legend marking the date of his death (September 13th 1806). Reverse: The winged figure of Victory holds two wreaths astride a globe with a map of England. The legend LIBERTATIS. HVMANITATISQVE. VINDEX underlines Fox's reputation as a humanitarian and defender of liberty, (BHM 604. Eimer 979). *Toned, good extremely fine or better, scarce.*

This rare medal is remarkably well preserved and deeply toned in shades of green and gold. Charles Fox (1749-1806) was a prominent British (Whig Party) statesman whose career in the British Parliament spanned 38 years, and an arch rival of William Pitt (the younger) who was the Tory Prime Minister for many years in the late 18th century. Fox was a brilliant orator. In 1782 he was briefly Britain's first Foreign Secretary under the Premiership of the Marquis of Rockingham. He returned to the post, for a while, in the next year and again just before his death in 1806. Fox was a diehard opponent of King George III whom he regarded as a tyrant, and instinctively he supported the revolutionaries in America when the conflict with the British forces escalated. It is said that he would frequently dress himself in the colours of Gorege Washington's army! A famous gambler, womaniser and lover of foreign fashion, Fox was also a leading advocate of religious tolerance and individual liberty and a great anti-slavery campaigner.

William Pitt the Younger was the youngest British Prime Minister on record, assuming the post at the age of 24 in December 1783. He entered Cambridge University at the age of 14 and became a Member of the British Parliament at 22. As Chancellor of the Exchequer or Finance Minister he was a great success, and the Tories and friends of King George III helped propel him to the Premiership. Having resigned in 1801, he returned as Prime Minister in 1804. He gained the support of the Russian, Austrian and Swedish leaders in an attempt to defeat Napoleon Bonaparte, but it is said that the news of Napoleon's victory at Austerlitz in October 1806 contributed to Pitt's premature death aged 45, which was actually as a result of kidney failure caused by excessive drinking. Ironically, though he was a former finance minister, he was heavily in debt upon his death and Parliament raised 40,000 (around \$80,000) to pay his creditors. His greatest achievements were reform of the economy and the abolition of slavery.
