Major General Robert Walter Dickson Leslie was born on 31 January 1883 in England and was educated at Hilton College and Michaelhouse, Natal, South Africa. His grandfather was Rear Admiral F L Field CB, CMG, RN, 3rd Sea Lord. He underwent his medical training in Dublin, Ireland qualifying in 1904. Two years later he entered the Royal Army Medical Corps and held the rank of Captain when World War I commenced. In the years from 1917 to 1937 he rose from the rank of Brevet Major to Major General. For his World War I service, towards the end of which he was an Assistant Director of Medical Services (A.D.M.S.) in France, he was mentioned in despatches and appointed an OBE in the King's 1919 Birthday Honours list.

In 1930 he was promoted to Lieutenant Colonel and appointed Deputy Assistant Director of Medical Services (D.A.D.M.S.) in India, a post he held until 1932. He was promoted to Colonel in 1934 and in 1936 was appointed D.D.M.S. in Palestine and Transjordania. Upon his return to the UK he was in command of the Queen Alexandra Military Hospital, Millbank until 1937. In that same year he was promoted to Major General and appointed D.D.M.S., Northern Command, York. On 28 March 1939 he was appointed Honorary Physician to the King (LG 25/4/1939, p2751).

In 1941 he was appointed CB and retired from the Army. During his Army career, Maj Gen Leslie wrote several articles which were published in the Journal of the Royal Army Medical Corps. After he retired from the Army he received an appointment as a hospital officer in the Emergency Medical Service (E.M.S.) and from 1948 to 1954 was employed as a regional medical officer (No.3 region) under the Ministry of Health. For his services to the E.M.S. he was appointed CBE (Civil Division) in the 1946 New Year Honours list. He was also a member of the Council of the British Medical Association from 1942 to 1948 serving on the Naval and Military Committee of the Association from 1944 to 1948 and on the General Medical Council Committee (1946-8) and the Central Medical War Committee (1947-8). He died at his home at East Leake, near Loughborough, Leicestershire on 31 January 1957 aged 74.

James Berry, stationer's assistant, born 1895 at Salford, Lancashire, England. James was awarded the Military Medal for his part in the Battle of Bapaume on 25 March 1918. The 1/7th, part of the 125th Infantry Brigade, were in a position covering the southwest and south of Sapignies. The brigade was attacked at 6am but this was repulsed by the 1/5th Lancs. At 8am the whole brigade was subjected to a barrage, one hour and twenty minutes later the enemy again advanced. By 10.50am the enemy was attacking in full force at the centre of the 1/5th.

The regimental history records as follows:- 'From early morning on this day the 1/7th on the brigade's right flank had a very gruelling time, fighting many ding dong battles on the ridge which runs south and south-west from Sapignes, and earning many honours under the able and inspiring leadership of Lieutenant Colonel G.S.Brewis DSO.'

Unfortunately James Berry did not live long enough to receive his Military Medal as he was killed in action while in the line at Bucquoy, France on 3 April 1918. He is buried at Gommecourt British Cemetery No 2, Hebuterne, 19km south west of Arras.

Uncle: Charles Higgins was born in 1854. He was the grandson of Lt-Colonel Charles Thomas Higgins, H.E.I.C.S. 1785-1827, a prominent soldier. His father moved to Australia with his family in 1880 and settled in Melbourne. He served in the South Africa Wars 1877-79 with Cape Mounted Rifles. There is no record that he died in the war but he did die on the West Coast of Africa. His sister, the youngest member of the family was Catherine Emma, born in 1859 and she married Charles William Ironmonger of Wolverhampton in 1889. They went to Australia in 1891, the year that her father died, and it was here that their son Eric was born. They returned to England but Charles William Ironmonger's business, Ironmonger's Rope Works, went into liquidation in 1902 and after WWI they made a permanent move to Australia with their two sons, Eric Harold and Humphrey Carlos.

Eric Ironmonger was born in Australia and went to England with his parents at an early age. He attended the King Edward VI School from 1902-4. After school he served an apprenticeship with National Telephone Co, Wolverhampton. He also enlisted in the Territorial Forces Army Reserves in England when 18 years of age. In WWI he served in the AIF, including service on Gallipoli. In the early 1920s he purchased a block of land in Corumbene Road, Gosford from Garnet Adcock (See lot 1120 in this sale). He also served in WWII and after the war he returned to take control of the printing business he founded. He died in 1966. In 2001 the business of Office National, formerly known as C. and E. Ironmonger, one of the oldest businesses in the area, was gutted by fire when its premises in Mann St, Gosford were destroyed.

Lieut. Errey with four men, in the face of very heavy M.G. fire rushed through our own barrage and attacked and captured the Strong Point together with 5 Officers, 60 Other Ranks and 2 Machine Guns. This officer's most conspicuous bravery, determination and prompt action undoubtedly saved many lives and altered the situation at a critical moment enabling the line to be firmly established. (Awarded DSO).

Recommendation: During the operations in front of Quaent and Pronville, 19 April 1917, 2/Lieut. Errey's work was of an extremely courageous and useful nature. His duties included the patrolling of No Man's Land in front of his Company sector. In this he showed the greatest courage and initiative. He went through the enemy's wire and gained valuable information at great personal risk. On the night of 10th April 1917 he encountered an enemy patrol of 36 strong. His party was only 8 strong and the enemy endeavoured to surround him. Notwithstanding this he gave them fight, and succeeded in driving them off with bombs and rifle fire. He handled his men with great skill and got back without casualty, the enemy leaving 4 dead on the field. Lieut. Errey is a young officer who has been with the Battalion since shortly after its inception and is a splendid leader and absolutely fearless.

Leonard George Prentice Errey, carpenter, age 22, born at Camperdown, Vic; he was a member of a family famous in the field of horticulture, the business having been started by his father, not long after arriving from England in 1857, under the name W.H.Errey & Sons and later Errey Bros, being famous in the world of horticulture, at different times, for carnations, gladioli and irises; Enl.16Aug1914 at Camperdown, previous service with Camperdown Rifle Club; Emb.22Dec1914 and to Gallipoli with the Landing on 25April1915 as part of the second wave of troops; was also at the 2nd Battle for Krithia on 08May1915; apptd L/Cpl at Anzac 08Dec1915; T/Cpl 23Feb1916; to School of Instruction at Zeitoun 03Mar1916; to Sg 08Jul1916; to 2 Lieutenant 'In the Field' 13Sep1916; awarded MC 17May1917; to Lieutenant 28May1917; WIA 04Oct1917, wounded by a fragment of a shell to his left shoulder shortly after the advance started; DOW same day at 1st Anzac Central Bureau; buried Menin Road South Military Cemetery, Ypres, Belgium; awarded DSO for action 20Sep1917; Special mention in despatches 07Nov1917.

In the book, Off to the Western Front, chapter 8 recounts that the 1st, 2nd and 3rd Australian Divisions together with a New Zealand Division were in the centre of an attacking line of 12 Divisions to capture the high ground at Broodseinde Ridge. Field Marshall Sir Douglas Haig was determined to capture the objective from enemy hands at almost any price. On the eve of the attack (3rd October) the Intelligence Officer, Lieutenant Len Errey DSO, MC, and his men laid out the white marker tape on the ground. All the officers and NCOs were taken over the first part of the marked route to ensure they were well prepared for the impending attack. All men were ready and waiting for the designated time of attack which was 6am. Unfortunately the Germans started shelling at the rear trenches at 5.30am. The men in forward positions had to remain silent so as not to alert the enemy of the impending attack but in the meantime the shelling took a heavy toll and one of those wounded and who subsequently died was the Intelligence Officer, Lieutenant Errey.

Lieutenant L.G.P.Errey's brother, Edwin B.Errey, was mortally wounded at Mont St Quentin about 01Sep1918. Both brothers' names are recorded on the Camperdown Presbyterian Church Honour Roll as well as at the Australian War Memorial, Canberra.



Telegram dated at Epping 19 September 1914 from Captain Brownlow, District Naval Officer, Sydney, to Mrs Corbould, Asheldone, Essex St, Epping (this was the family home [photo included with lot]), advising 'that it is feared that submarine AE1 has been lost. Your son was on Board and in view of probability of loss of Vessel I desire to convey to you and yours the deepest sympathy and condolences of the Minister of Defence the Naval Boards and myself in your loss.' The writing on page one of the message is affected where it is obvious that Mrs Corbould's tears have dropped on the page as she read the sad words. The envelope for the telegram is also included.
- 4. Letter dated 11 October 1914 to Mrs Corbould from Mollie Patey on Admiralty House, Sydney letterhead. Mrs Patey was the wife of Admiral Sir George Patey, Commander of the Australian Naval & Miltary Expeditionary Force that captured German New Guinea. In her letter Mrs Patey advises Mrs Corbould of the details of what her husband had told her regarding the loss of AE1 and her hope that she is feeling better than when she last met her.
- 5. Various letters of condolences including from Epping Branch Red Cross Society; Sydney City Mission; Christ Church, Enmore.
- 6. Flodial compass by Short & Mason, c1915.
- 7. Large b &w photo (oval 35x27cm) of Gordon Corbould in navy uniform and with Submarine qualification badge on right arm, in decorative, shaped timber frame (63x53cm) with a small rectangular plaque fitted and inscribed, 'Gordon Clarence Corbould/Leading Seaman Age $26/Lost\ A.E.\ 1\ R.A.N./14th$. Sept. 1914'. Also a small studio photo from which this large photo has been made.
- 8. Book titled 'Hymns for Infant Minds and Original Hymns for Sunday Schools' by Ann & Jane Taylor, London 1881, hard cover, 139pp, inside at front inscribed, 'Gordon Clarence Corbould/With his Aunt Charlotte's Kind love/ Christmas 1893'.

He also mentions classing up for one month's course of theory on Submarines and also that he expects to go straight to Barrow-in-Furness straight after Easter leave to stand by our own Subs, but he does not think he will be coming home to Australia any time soon as they are no where ready and when they are they will need to go through an exhaustive series of trials.

Another hand-written letter from H.M.Submarine Depot dated 17th June 1913 in which, among other things, Gordon tells his mother that 'the latest buzzes that are going round, we will be leaving for Barrow at the end of this month to get our own Subs which are nearly ready for us & we leave in October for Australia.'

Gordon Clarence Corbould was born 10Apr1887 at Strawberry Hills, Surry Hills, Sydney, NSW; Enl.30Sep1908 in RN for 5 years; on 08Dec1910 as Able Seaman on HMS Challenger agreed to serve for a further 5 years from that date; he served with RN service no.1090; he entered the RAN on 17Dec1912 for a period of 7 years under no.7297 with units, ANF (Australasian Naval Forces comprising Australians and New Zealanders who had joined the RN), RAN, AE1; prior to WW1 Gordon went to England for higher ratings training and while there he joined the submarine service; posted at London Depot from 17Dec1912 to 27Feb1914 during the construction and trials of the Australian submarines; he returned to Australia when submarines AE1 and AE2 sailed from the UK on 28 February 1914 and arrived in Sydney on 24 May 1914.

When Gordon returned in May, one tribute stated that when he came home to his mother and sister he was 'a manly man, six feet tall, broadened out, and as handsome as ever, brace as a lion, and God-fearing, knowing that at any moment he might be called upon for real war.' Gordon had some illustrious forbears including a great uncle, Admiral Sir James Scott, whose services secured him the thanks of both Houses of Parliament and at his death honourable burial at St Paul's Cathedral, London. His grandfather, Richard Chilton Corbould was an artist of Kensington and a great uncle, Edward Henry Corbould, was another artist of note whose painting 'Lady Godiva' was placed in the Sydney Art Gallery.

Died in accidental loss of AE1 in St George's Channel, New Pomerania, Bismarck Archipelago, German New Guinea on 14Sep1914.

Commemorated in the Commemorative Area at the Australian War Memorial, Canberra, also at the Monument to the Fallen at Epping, Sydney, NSW and at Plymouth Naval Memorial, Plymouth, Devon, England.

Submarine AE1 was the first of two E Class submarines built for the newly formed Royal Australian Navy and was commissioned at Portsmouth, England on 28 February 1914. She sailed from England to Australia with her sister ship AE2 and arrived at Sydney on 24 May 1914. She was crewed with a mixture of Australian RAN sailors and British RN on attachment, all under the command of British officers on loan to the RAN. When WWI broke out AE1 and 2 joined with the Australian Naval and Military Expeditionary Force assigned to capture the German Pacific colonies and both took part in the operations that led to the Australian occupation of German New Guinea when the German forces at Rabaul surrendered on 13 September 1914.

The following day the destroyer HMAS Parramatta rendezvoused with AE1 off Herbertshohe at 8.00am and exchanged signals before proceeding to Cape Gazelle. The ships arrived at about 9.00am and again had an exchange of signals with Parramatta advising AE1 that her orders were 'to search to the south'ard with submarine and anchor off Herbertshohe at 5.30pm'.

Parramatta then proceeded independently in a southerly direction while AE1 advanced in a north-easterly direction. The weather was hazy and visibility was observed to be about 9 to 10 nautical miles, at times decreasing to 5 miles. Parramatta reported that AE1 was obscured by the haze for some time, as was the nearest land. Because of these conditions, Parramatta's Captain, Lieutenant W.H.F.Warren, RAN, considered it advisable not to lose sight of the submarine for too long.

At 12.30pm Parramatta turned to the north-west and by 2.30pm she was close to AE1 when the submarine asked by signal: 'What is the distance of visibility?' Parramatta responded: 'About 5 miles'. At 3.20pm Parramatta lost sight of AE1 and despite heading to her last known location no sign of AE1 was found. Parramatta was operating under the assumption that AE1 had returned to Herbertshohe. Parramatta later anchored off Herbertshohe at 7.00pm but by 8.00pm the submarine had not returned and Parramatta and HMAS Yarra were ordered to search for her. HMAS Sydney, also heading to the area was instructed to keep a lookout and later HMA Ships Encounter and Warrego also joined the search together with launches from Rabaul and Herbertshohe. No trace of AE1 was ever found, not even a shimmer of escaping oil on the water which would indicate some mishap.

The loss of AE1 with her entire complement of 3 officers and 32 sailors was the RAN's first major loss of WWI and it marred an otherwise successful operation to seize the German possession in New Guinea and the South Pacific. It is not known what caused AE1 to disappear without trace. The area where she disappeared has many deep water areas and there is much volcanic activity throughout the region which has an affect on instruments used to locate wrecks and there are presumed to be many other wrecks in the region from WWII action. Despite several searches to locate her none have been successful. AE1 was finally recognised for her service with the retrospective award in 2010 of the battle honour 'Rabaul 1914'.

The crew lost on AE1 comprised 3 officers of the Royal Navy, and the ratings included 16 other RN serving with RAN, 1 RN on loan to RAN and 15 RAN, the nationalities being 20 Great Britain, 14 Australian and 1 New Zealand.

There is a stained glass window at the naval chapel at Garden Island commemorating the WWI loss of both AE1 and AE2. There is also a floating structure to AE1 outside the Australian National Maritime Museum at Darling Harbour, Sydney.

There are many references to Colonel Disher in most official texts of WWII. He is mentioned on p2 'The War Diaries of Weary Dunlop' by E.E.Dunlop.

Harold Clive Disher attended Scotch College in East Melbourne and Ormond College at the University of Melbourne (MB, BS, 1916; MD 1921). He rowed in Scotch College's head-of-the-river crews in 1910 and 1911 and was an exceptional oarsman. In 1919 he was Stroke in the AIF VIII No 1 crew which won the King's Cup in the Allies Eight Oared Race at the Royal Henley Peace Regatta. The trophy was subsequently placed in the Australian War Museum. Later the Australian Rowing Association asked the Memorial for the cup as a Perpetual Trophy for the Australian Eight-Oared Championships however the Memorial refused. Eventually a petition signed by Captain H.C.Disher was sent to the King who instructed that it was his wish that the Cup should be used as a permanent trophy and be competed for annually in the Interstate Eight-oared Race of Australia. This is why the trophy bears an appropriate inscription regarding the presentation by the AIF No.1 Crew and the agreement of King George V.

Harold Disher and Edward 'Weary' Dunlop were the first two Australian medical officers to arrive in Palestine. Disher had been the teacher of anaesthetics to 'Weary' Dunlop in Melbourne and he was now serving under his old teacher. After retiring from medicine Clive Disher lived at Strathfieldsaye, a sheep and cattle station in Gippsland. He inherited the property and remained there until his death in 1976. Childless, he donated the pastoral property to the University of Melbourne which in turn established the Strathfieldsaye Institute of Teaching and Research in Agriculture and Allied Sciences. A portrait painted after his death by Sir William Dargie is held by the Melbourne University Boat Club and some of his military documents, correspondence and miniature medals are held by the University of Melbourne archives.

Garnet Ingamells Adcock, mining engineer, age 21, born at Geelong, Vic; he was a member of the Australian Institute of Mining & Metallurgy and his father was George H.Adcock, Viticultural College, Rutherglen, Vic; Enl.03May 1916 at Broadmeadow, Vic, previous service with Senior Cadets and 67th Infantry, currently serving with No 5 Tunnelling Coy; at the time he held 26 certificates in scientific and technical subjects from the Government of Victoria and had been State Honourman in chemistry; appt Lt and Emb.25May1916; served with No 2 and 5 Tunnelling Coys; suffered shell shock 29Dec1916; appt Adjutant 2nd Tunnelling Coy 01Feb1917 and Captain 11Jan1918; married Belgium national, Marguerite Marie Van Coillie at Orleans, France on 25Nov1918; 04May-04Jun1919 granted leave for non-military employment to work at Perfume Factory of MM Euziere & Lafitte at Grasse near Nice, France; 05Jun-05Jul1919 granted leave again to attend course in Herb & Medicinal Plant Culture at 'The Whins' High School, at Bucks, England and also to deliver a course of lectures on Plant Product Chemistry to the school; RTA 04Sep1919 with his wife; appt terminated 21Oct1919; he remained a member of the Army Reserve; awarded Colonial Auxiliary Forces Officers' Decoration in 1931; served in WWII; Enl.18Jul1942 at St Ives, Sydney, NSW; Disch.27Mar1946 as Lt Colonel ex HQ VDC (he was Commanding Officer of the Volunteer Defence Corps in NSW)

Garnet's son, Albert Van Coillie also served in WWII as a Captain with $35\ \mathrm{Bn}.$

Soon after returning from WWI, Garnet Adcock purchased a farm in the Gosford district on the NSW Central Coast. This property included the historic Fagan's Cottage built in 1836-40. He intended to build a career in the perfume industry but soon turned his attention to the citrus industry. He erected a factory and started using citrus oil as a base for his perfumes but soon established a company called Fruit and Vegetable By-Products to utilise the fruit he was throwing away after extracting the juice for perfume. This company became Jusfrute and just five years later he dropped the perfume part of his operations and became one of the first in the world to make an emulsion from the skin of citrus fruit to use as a flavour for soft drinks. The company was very successful but in 1965 it was taken over by Keith Harris & Co with Garnet's son, Van, appointed Managing Director in 1972, a position he held until his retirement in 1977. The factory was closed in 1982 because of a lack of a good supply of fruit in the Gosford area.

Garnet Adcock was the second President of the Gosford RSL 1921-24. He also qualified as a lawyer. He made an unsuccessful run for NSW State parliament in 1931 nominating for the seat of Hawksbury as a member of the Country Party. He wrote several books and articles, some of these books are, The Perfume Industry and its Possibilities in Australia by Capt. G.I.Adcock, 1920; How to Deal with Military Offences (A.I.F. & A.M.F.) by Lieut-Colonel G.I.Andcock, V.D., 18th Battalion (The Kurig-gai Regt), A.M.F., Barrister-at-Law, 1941; The Jusfrute Book by G.I.Adcock, 1949, A Textbook of Soft Drink Manufacture; Citrus in the Gosford District by Chemist G.I.Adcock, V.D., M.S.E., Managing Director, Jusfrute Ltd.

Garnet Ingamells Adcock died on 18 December 1956 and is buried at Point Clare Cemetery, Gosford, NSW along with his wife and son, albiet in different locations. Tributes to Garnet Adcock in the Gosford area include Adcock Park, Racecourse Road, West Gosford and also Garnet Adcock Memorial Park, West Gosford.

Of the twelve Australians in this group, only six survived, QX17187 Pte K.Bridgeham, VX15714 Pte M.B.Jenkins, NX37405 Pte W.H.Loughland, NX9468 Sgt R.W.Newman, VX16651 Pte H.Nossack, and SX6803 Pte J.A.Wilson, all from 2/1 AGH. These survivors were picked up by HMS Herthrop and landed at Alexandria on 24 December 1941.

The Australian Hospital Ship Centaur, under ship's master Captain George A.Murray, was sailing to the South West Pacific Area of operations carrying 12 nurses and 190 2/2 Field Amb plus 3 attached and one Red Cross representative. In the early hours of 14 May 1943 it was torpedoed by a Japanese submarine and sunk about thirty nautical miles off the southern tip of Moreton Island despite being appropriately lit and clearly marked as a hospital ship. Of the 332 people on board, both crew and passengers, only 64 survived. The dead included 45 Merchant Navy personnel including the ship's master, 212 Australian Army medical and field ambulance officers and soldiers and 11 Army nurses. This was the greatest loss of life in Australian waters from a ship of the Merchant Navy.

Only one nurse, Sister Ellen Savage, survived and although injured herself, she was awarded the George Medal for the help she gave the other survivors, some of whom were suffering from burns or were injured. Cpl A.J.Taylor was one of only 15 members of 2/12 Field Ambulance to survive. The survivors spent an agonising 35 hours on rafts or on debris floating on the water before being rescued by an American destroyer, USS Mugford, under the command of Lt-Commander Howard J.Corey USN.

The despicable act of attacking and sinking a hospital ship violated all the principles of common humanity and was declared a war crime in violation of the Geneva Convention of 1908. The commander of the Japanese submarine, Lt-Commander Hajime Nakagawa was later tried for war crimes and was sentenced at the Nagasaki war trials of 1948 to six years' hard labour after pleading guilty to machine gunning survivors of a British merchant ship he sank in the Indian Ocean. He was never tried for the sinking of AHS Centaur because investigators, although they believed he was responsible, did not have sufficient evidence to make a case. Hajime Nakagawa died in 1991 and even after the wreck of the Centaur was found in 2009, the Japanese Government refused to take responsibility for the sinking by claiming that circumstances surrounding the event remain unclear. However, a book, History of Submarine Warfare by a Japanese Navy Rear Admiral published in 1979, acknowledged that Nakawaga was responsible.

In 1950 Albert Taylor applied for the Pacific Star but his application was rejected because even though he was on board AHS Centaur and on the way to the SWPA the ship was sunk before reaching the qualifying area of operations.




