Dr Francis Penny studied medicine at King's College, London where he was a Warneford Scholar and in 1884 qualified for the diplomas, M.R.C.S.Eng and L.S.A.Lond. He was a house-surgeon at King's College and later held posts at the North Devon Infirmary, Barnstaple and the Doncaster Infirmary. Apparently he was also a brilliant half-back of the Barnstaple Football Club. He served as a civil surgeon in the war in South Africa. In a letter to a friend Dr Penny wrote, 'I was coming home this month, but now have taken on as senior medical officer of Steinacker's Horse, so shall not be home for a year or so, as I hear it is to be a permanent corps, even after the War is over. I am to rig up in all the trappings and decorations of a captain in His Majesty's Army, with the special tabs of the Medical Corps.' Post war his interest in travel and exploration led to various medical appointments in mining companies. For about six years he was medical superintendent at the Mount Vernon Sanatorium. Dr Penny, aged 65, died in Doncaster Infirmary on 15 April 1928 from injuries received in a car accident five days earlier at Rossington where his car overturned.

Ship's Master Torpedoed Three Times Recognised Three Times For Bravery Blue Star Line Marine Superintendent for Australia

MBE (Civil): LG 16/12/1941 to James Hunter Andrew Mackie, Esq., Chief Officer.

Citation: The ship took part in a vital operation throughout which she was exposed to the hazards of surface, submarine and air attack. For the last four days she fought off a series of determined air attacks and on the last day she was torpedoed and flooding started in the holds. In spite of this and of the fact that the main engines were badly shaken, the Master, the Chief Engineer and the Chief Officer, with a volunteer party set to work to control the flooding and repair the damage. By this time the ship had drifted to within three miles of an enemy position. In spite of difficulty, the engines were re-started and a speed of fourteen knots achieved until, out of range of enemy guns, steam could be reduced and the strain on bulkheads eased. A final air attack was made when the ship had almost reached safety. The guns were manned once more, and the enemy was driven off.

It was due to the courage, resource and leadership of the Master and his Officers that the valuable ship was brought at last to safety.

OBE (Civil): LG 31/8/1943 to Captain James Hunter Andrew Mackie, MBE, Master and also MBE to James Nuttall, Esq., Third Engineer Officer.

Citation: The ship, sailing alone, was torpedoed in darkness. She sustained heavy damage and two boats were wrecked. When it was seen that there was no prospect of saving the vessel, abandonment was ordered. Although the ship sank in twelve minutes, two boats and four rafts were successfully launched and all but two of the crew boarded them. The survivors were rescued the following day.

The Master acted with courage, coolness and resource throughout. It was due to his excellent organisation and leadership that in the difficult and dangerous circumstances the ship was successfully abandoned. The Third Engineer Officer, although not on watch when the ship was hit, went below and, at great personal risk from escaping fumes, succeeded in stopping the engines. This materially assisted the successful launching of the boats and rafts. In order to stop the engines Mr.Nuttall had to obtain suitable tools from the refrigerator space while the ship was sinking. He completed his task and reached the deck just in time to jump clear as the ship sank.

#### Lloyd's Medal: Lloyd's List & Shipping Gazette, Friday 1/1/1943.

Citation: While engaged in a vital operation the ship was exposed to the dangers of air, surface and submarine attack. During the last four days she battled against a number of determined air attacks, and on the last day she was torpedoed by an enemy E-boat. Although flooding began in the holds and the main engines were severely shaken, the master, chief engineer and chief officer, helped by volunteers, set to work to get the flooding under control and to repair the damage. The ship had now drifted to within three miles of an enemy position. With difficulty the engines were restarted and a speed of fourteen knots attained until they got out of range of enemy guns, when steam was reduced and the strain on the bulkheads eased. When the ship had almost reached safety a last attack was made from the air, but the enemy was driven off. The courage, resource and fine example of the master, chief engineer and chief officer enabled the valuable ship to make port.

James Hunter Andrew Mackie was born at Glasgow, Lanarkshire, Scotland in 1896. During WWII he was a maritime officer with the Blue Star Line of merchant ships. At the start of the war he had a narrow escape when he was transferred from the Doric Star before she left on a return trip to Auckland, Sydney and Table Bay to transport meat and dairy products. Unfortunately, on 2 December 1939, she encountered the German pocket battleship Admiral Graf Spee south of St Helena and was sunk.

He was not to be so lucky when serving as Chief Officer on the Sydney Star, part of the Malta Convoy in 1941. There were 600 troops on board and a cargo of essential materials to relieve the siege on the island of Malta when the ship was torpedoed by a German E-boat in the Mediterranean Sea on 24 July. The troops were transferred to a destroyer and the captain, taking the last chance for the ship and her valuable cargo, sent her full steam ahead to berth in Malta ahead of the convoy, severely damaged, but with the vital cargo intact.

Then again, Captain Mackie was ship's master of the Celtic Star which was torpedoed and sunk on 29 March 1943 by the Italian submarine Guiseppe Finzi south west of Freetown, Sierra Leone. The ship was hit fore and aft by two torpedoes and went down in twelve minutes. Captain Mackie and the Chief Radio Officer stayed with the ship until 40 seconds before she was submerged until they knew their SOS message had reached Admiralty.

On 26 September 1945 Captain and Mrs Mackie left England on Australia Star. He and his wife left the ship in Cairns before heading to Sydney where they were to take up residency with Captain Mackie appointed Marine Superintendent for Australia of the Blue Star Line.

# AO to Prominent Psychologist and Author Deputy Vice Chancellor of University of Sydney

William 'Bill' O'Neil was born in 1912 and raised on the family sheep station on the northwest plains of NSW. He was home educated until age nine and then studied in The NSW Correspondence School. Later he attended De La Salle College at Armidale where he passed his Leaving Certificate and was awarded a Teacher's College Scholarship to the University of Sydney. At university he was awarded the Lithgow Scholarship and the Frank Albert Prize in Psychology before graduating in 1933 as Bachelor of Arts with first class honours and the University Medal for Psychology. He completed his Diploma of Education winning the Burfit Prize but did not qualify for his Teacher's Certificate. However, he did undertake research for a Master of Arts at the university and qualified with first class honours and again was awarded the University Medal for Psychology in 1935.

Between 1936-1940 he was Psychologist-in-Charge of The Vocational Guidance Section in the NSW Department of Labour and Industry and then moved to Sydney Technical College as Vocational and Research Officer. Then in 1945 Professor O'Neil applied for and was appointed to the McCaughey Chair of Psychology. Bill O'Neil was a leading figure in the development of academic and professional psychology in Australia and a respected administrator. He was appointed Deputy Vice Chancellor of the University of Sydney in 1965. In 1969 the Australian Psychological Society made him an Honorary Fellow and in 1970 he was recognised by the university with an Honorary D.Litt. After retiring in 1977 he continued his interests in psychology and the history of astronomy. Then on 6 June 1978 the Australian Government recognised his service to education and learning by appointing him as an Officer of the Order of Australia.

Bill O'Neil wrote about various conceptual issues and his books include An Introduction to Method in Psychology (1957), The Beginnings of Modern Psychology (1968, 2nd ed. 1982), Fact and Theory: An Aspect of the Philosophy of Science (1969), Time and Calendars (1975), Early astronomy from Babylonia to Copernicus (1986), and A Century of Psychology in Australia (1987). Bill was also prominent in various societies involved in the area of psychology including serving as the second Chairman of the Social Sciences Research Council during 1964-66.

Emeritus Professor William Mathew O'Neil, an Honorary Fellow of the Academy of Social Sciences and regarded as one of the foremost psychologists that Australia has produced, died at his Sydney home on 1 June 1991.

Constantine William Cowley was born in New South Wales, Australia on 1 May 1793, the same year that Andrew Douglas White (23 September 1793), the son of Surgeon General White was born, also in New South Wales. Both went on to become Military Officers, White serving with the Royal Engineers in the Peninsular Wars and Cowley with the British Forces in India. Both had mothers who were convicts, and like White, Cowley rose to officer status. His father was a prominent surgeon, his mother a convict, and his name an alias (not so with White). Let us examine the players in this story.

His father, Dennis Considen was born in Ireland and sailed with the First Fleet as surgeon on the Scarborough. After landing at Sydney Cove, Considen, like the principal surgeon, John White, studied the natural history of the surrounding area and put to good use his discoveries by using the products of the indigenous plants to alleviate dysentery, scurvy and other diseases which plagued the early settlement. In November 1788 he proclaimed himself to Sir Joseph Banks as the colony's pharmaceutical pioneer, although these claims were disputed by others, Considen is at least credited with the discovery of eucalyptus oil for medicinal purposes. In November 1791, after a period of working on Norfolk Island with D'Arcy Wentworth, Considen was relieved by William Balmain. During his time in Australia, Dennis Considen was also legal guardian to the children of Balmain, an assistant surgeon on the First Fleet and the successor to principal surgeon John White. Dennis returned to Sydney where he continued his clandestine relationship with a convict woman, Ann Green (nee Cowley). Between 1790 and 1791 Ann was to have a baby girl, Constance Cowley, and records indicate that Dennis Considen was the father but they also indicate that the baby was born at Norfolk Island. Was Ann working there as an indentured servant to Considen?

What of Ann Green? She was born in England in about 1759 to a working class family and as a new mother whose husband died just three months before her child was born and with no money, she turned to crime to support herself and infant child. She attempted to steal a quantity of China so she could sell it and get some money but was caught by the shop owner and his wife and escorted to the police station. Ann Green was charged and tried for Theft - Grand Larceny 13 December 1786. The case was tried and although Ann, and even the Prosecutor, pleaded for the court to show her mercy, she

was sentenced to Transportation for Seven Years. Ann and her newborn were on the First Fleet convict ship Lady Penryn that left Portsmouth on 13 May 1787. Unfortunately her new baby, William, died before the ship sailed and during the voyage the grieving Ann formed a relationship with the ship's captain, William Sever. The product of their union was a daughter born on 9 November 1788 and baptised Letitia Green.

Ann had married William Bladdy (also recorded as Bledy and Blady), another convict, on 31 March 1793, however her relationship with Dennis Considen resulted in another pregnancy and a son, Constantine, was born at the tented hospital in Sydney Cove on 1 May 1793. How she hid this from her new husband, is unknown. Or did he know she was pregnant when they married and didn't care? The potential scandal for Dennis would do irreparable damage to his career but he did the honourable thing and did not desert his son. Rather, he referred to him in correspondence with his peers as his nephew. When his health declined, Dennis returned to Ireland on the Kitty departing the colony in June 1793. He made arrangements with Ann, probably of a monetary nature, and she agreed to allow Constantine to accompany his father to Ireland and no doubt a better life. It is unknown what became of Constance Cowley when Dennis left New South Wales. Once in Ireland, Dennis re-registered his son's birth to avoid the stigma of a convict mother in Sydney and recorded Ann's maiden name of Cowley as his son's last surname. Dennis then raised Constantine as his son but under the guise of being his uncle.

Considen put his botanical studies in New South Wales to good use when he wrote a thesis titled De Tetano and on 24 June 1804 he graduated from the University of Edinburgh as a doctor of medicine. He then went to London trying to decide where to practise but soon moved to County Clare in Ireland. However it was not meant to be because he was called to Cork to join an expedition bound for the Cape. Even from afar his interest in the fledgling colony and its indigenous plants was keen and he may well have returned but his request for a grant of land was refused by Governor King. He maintained contact with his friends there, Thomas Arndell, George Johnston and D'Arcy Wentworth but declared astonishment at the conduct of the last two when Governor William Bligh was overthrown. On 6 January 1812 he was admitted a licentiate of the College of Physicians. He died on 29 December 1815. His name will forever be remembered because in 1904 the government botanist at the time, Joseph Maiden, dedicated 'eucalyptus consideniana' in his memory in recognition of his pioneer work with eucalyptus oil.

Meanwhile Constantine received a first rate education at Newington and an upbringing free from any links to his convict mother. In 1812 he applied to be an Ensign in the Honourable East India Company with the support of his father's recommendation. On his application, Constantine listed Dennis Considen as his next-of-kin and his 'uncle's' occupation as Physician to the Forces. His application was accepted and on 30 September 1814 he began a lifetime in India, first as part of the 1/17th Bengal Native Infantry and after service with the Mirzapur Local Battalion he transferred to the 2/17th Bengal NI.

As an officer, Constantine flourished and was promoted to Lieutenant in March 1818. He served at the siege and capture of Bhurtpore and was Adjutant of the 35th Bengal NI (late 2/17th). He was promoted to Captain in November 1827 and served with the 35th Bengal NI during the first Afghan War at the capture of Ghuznee in 1839, for which he was awarded the medal being offered here. In 1831 he married Katherine Meiselbach in India. She was the daughter of Colonel Johan Frederick Meiselbach of the Dutch East India Company and whose father was the Dutch explorer of the same name who was involved in Dutch expeditions in the 1760s to the west coast of New Holland (previous name for Australia).

What became of Constantine's convict mother? She already had two daughters when Constantine was born, Letitia Green born in 1788 and Constance Cowley, also fathered by Dennis Considen, born between 1790 and 1791 on Norfolk Island, and she then had two more children, a daughter Jane born on 7 January 1795 and a son, Thomas born on 24 April 1797. Ann had been granted 50 acres of land at Mulgrave Place in 1797 and her husband William Bladdy received a grant in 1802 and by 1820 the family held 70 acres on the Hawksbury River. In 1812 Ann Bladdy was recorded as housekeeper at Government House, Windsor. She died in 1820 at age 67.

One of Constantine's half-sisters, Letitia, married in 1804 at the age of 16 to a Hawksbury settler named Roger Twyfield who was 38 at the time. Letitia may well have been the first colonial born girl to marry in the colony. She died in 1827. Constantine's other half sister, Jane, married Richard Ballard, second officer on Hunter and in 1813 they had a daughter, Jane Ann, and the details of his sister, Constance Cowley, are unknown. The history of his half brother Thomas is also unknown. One source in Ireland indicated that Constantine Cowley did attempt to find his mother and half sister, Letitia, in the 1820s however it was a failure, probably because his mother had already died and due to Australia's remote location.

It is also probably no coincidence that the children fathered by Dennis Considen were named Constance and Constantine, both starting with Cons.

In 1900 Nurse Mabel Steel A.N.S.R. (Australian Nursing Service Reserve) of the Benevolent Asylum was selected to go to South Africa. Miss Steel was from Tasmania, and trained at Sydney Hospital. Nursing Sister Steel was one of only fourteen nurses that accompanied the second Australian military contingent to South Africa in the Moravian that departed Sydney on 17 January 1900. Upon arrival, the Moravian unit was to proceed by sea to East London and thence to Sterkstroom and hand over to General Gatacre. As this unit was most urgently needed, the Moravian was turned around within a few hours of arriving at Cape Town and left for East London with all but two Army Medical Corps officers. From the composite Half-Bearer Company and Field Hospital units, two officers and twelve NCOs and men were detailed for special temporary duty at the stationary 100-bedded Field Hospital.

Lt Col Kelly was in command, Miss Gould, Lady Superintendent Army Nursing Service Reserve and three nursing sisters (NSW) were posted to this hospital. Four (NSW) nursing sisters were detailed for duty at the Base Hospital, East London and six nursing sisters went to the General Hospital, Wynberg. In a newspaper report, Principal Medical Officer Col Sommerville-Large RAMC at No.6 General Hospital, Johannesburg situated in the grounds of the Wanderer's Cricket Club stated that the Australian trained nurses including Mabel Steel were the most carefully trained nurses he had under his command. It was reported by The Examiner newspaper that Miss Mabel Steel of Falmouth, who had seen considerable service in South Africa as a nurse had returned to Tasmania in late October 1902. She returned with one of the New Zealand Contingents and after visiting Sydney where she had been living for several years, she went to Launceston en route to the home of her father, Mr John Steel of Falmouth.

There were only 14 Nurses (Women) in all the Military Contingents sent from NSW.

Sir Percy Claude Spender, KCVO, KBE, QC, (5 October 1897 - 3 May 1985), was an Australian politician, diplomat and jurist. He was born in Sydney, educated at Fort Street High School and later graduated in Law from the University of Sydney. He joined the Commonwealth Public Service in 1915, was admitted to the New South Wales Bar in 1923 and made a King's Counsel in 1935.

Spender was elected to the House of Representatives in 1937 as an Independent member for Warringah but soon after the election, he joined the government party, the United Australia Party, and although he held the seat until his resignation from federal politics in 1951, from 1944 he was a member of the Liberal Party.

Spender held a number of ministries in Robert Menzies' wartime government. He was Minister without portfolio assisting the Treasurer from April-November 1939, Vice-President of the Executive Council from January-March 1940, Treasurer until October 1940 and then Minister for the Army until the fall of Arthur Fadden's government in October 1941. He was also a member of the Economic Cabinet (1939-1940), War Cabinet (1939-1941) and the Advisory War Council (1940-1945).

Upon Menzies' return to power in 1949, Spender was made Minister for External Affairs (19 December 1949 - 26 April 1951) and Minister for External Territories. His greatest influence on Australian politics occurred during this period. He led Australian delegations to the British Commonwealth Conference in Colombo, Ceylon and to the Fifth Session of the United Nations General Assembly (of which he was the Vice-President).

At the conference in Colombo, he was instrumental in the development of the Colombo Plan (which had originally been known as the Spender Plan). He also played a large part in the signing of the ANZUS Pact and the San Francisco Peace Treaty (this was a Peace Treaty with Japan signed by 48 countries at San Francisco in 1951).

After leaving politics, Spender was appointed Australia's Ambassador to the United States (1951-58). He was the first Australian appointed to the International Court of Justice in The Hague (1958-1964) and was the Court's President 1964-67. He died in May 1985, aged 87.

Percy Spender was knighted in 1952 as a Knight Commander of the British Empire (KBE) and in 1957 was appointed a Knight Commander of the Royal Victorian Order (KCVO). In 1976 he was conferred a knighthood by the Italian Republic, namely the Order of Merit, that country's highest award. He also received ten honorary doctorates; however, a personal rift with Sir Robert Menzies prevented him from receiving the honour which he most desired, appointment to the Privy Council.

On gaining the final position, he organised his own Company and the men of two other Coys of which their Company Commanders and most of the Officers were casualties and took command of the line, consolidating and placing it in a good state of defence. His ever cheerful manner and coolness under extremely heavy fire were inspiring to all and it was largely due to his splendid work that the attack was a brilliant success.

Recommendation for Captain William Roy Harburn MC (Incorrectly shown in A.I.F. lists as R.W.Harburn): On night 12th/13th August, 1918, during an attack on enemy position East of Etinehem near Bray-sur-Somme this officer, who was in command of the Right Company, deployed his Company well out in front of our line and did splendid work in leading his men under hostile shell and Machine Gun fire to the attack on enemy trenches. On gaining the objective he organized and consolidated the new position and at once established touch on the flanks. His excellent work and splendid initiative greatly assisted in the success of the operation. Two companies of the 51st Bn made this attack and in consequence of the determined and skilful manner in which they were led an advance of 2000 yards was made and 183 prisoners captured at the cost of only five men wounded.

Albert Medal for Gallantry in Saving Life at Sea (Exchanged for George Cross): LG 20/8/1918, p9700, to Lieutenant Arthur Gerald Bagot, D.S.C., R.N.V.R. (In 1971 the UK Government made a decision, approved by The Queen, that surviving holders of the Albert Medal and Edward Medal would be required to exchange their awards for the George Cross - by then more widely recognised than its predecessors as an award for gallantry second only to the Victoria Cross, if not equivalent to it. Normally the surrendered medal was to remain in safe custody with the Home Office, on behalf of the Crown, but arrangements were possible whereby it could be presented, on behalf of the person to whom it was awarded, to a museum or other suitable body of his choice if the specifically requested this to be done. Mr Bagot requested that his Albert Medal should be presented to Geelong Grammar School, and the Home Secretary accordingly presented it to the school on his behalf and it now has an honoured place in the School.)

Citation: On the 12th April 1918, an explosion took place in the engineroom of H.M. Motor Launch 356, and the forward tanks burst into flames. The officer and some of the crew were blown overboard by the explosion, and the remainder were quickly driven aft by the flames, and were taken off in a skiff. By this time the flames were issuing from the cabin hatch aft, and there was much petrol burning on the surface of the water. It was then realised by the crews of adjacent vessels that the aft petrol tanks and the depth charge were being attacked by the fire, and might explode at any moment. At the moment when others were running away, Lieutenant Hoare and Sub-Lieutenant Bagot jumped into their dinghy, rowed to the wreck, got on board, and removed the depth charge, thereby preventing an explosion which might have caused serious loss of life amongst the crowd of English and French sailors on the quay.

Citation: Showed great coolness under fire. It was largely due to the magnificent manner in which the officers and men of Motor Launch 283 carried out their duties that so many officers and men of "Brilliant" and "Sirius" were rescued.

Arthur Gerald Bagot, born 26Apr1888 at Adelaide, Sth Aust; was a pupil at St Peters School, Adelaide and then Geelong Grammar School, Corio, Vic between Aug1903-1907 where he was member of the First XI in 1905 and 1906, the First XVIII in 1905 and 1906, rowed in the School Eight in 1906 and was a member of the United Public Schools Sports Team in 1905, 1906 and 1907, and was also active in the School Cadets holding the rank of Sergeant and in 1907 was a School Prefect; moved with his family to Heriot Bay, Vancouver, British Columbia, Canada in 1908; after leaving school he was a rancher; Enl.1916 from Canada into Royal Naval Volunteer Reserve as an officer with Motor Launch Division of the Dover Patrol; awarded DSC and Mentioned in Despatches for his part in motor launch ML283 in the attack on the enemy held ports of Zeebrugge and Ostend and the Albert Medal for Gallantry at Sea for an act of extreme heroism in Dunkirk harbour in 1918; Lieut Bagot was presented with the Albert Medal by King George V at Buckingham Palace on 11Sep1918; after demobilisation in Canada on 01Jan1920 he remained there for a few years before returning to South Australia; 1925 Bagot took up a mixed farming property, Roselyn Farm, near Piawaning, north of Perth, WA; WWII: was a member of the Volunteer Defence Corps from Jul1940; Enl.11Apr1942 at Wongan Hills, WA and TOS 25Apr1942; Appt A/Capt and then Capt 28Jul1942 with VDC (9Bn Northam); completed Bn Cmdrs Cse 3 A.C.S at Harvey 20Mar-10Apr1943; Appt terminated 15Oct1945 and placed on RL W.Comd (VDC) 16Oct1945; retired from farming in 1962 and relocated to suburb of Dalkeith in Perth; his wife died in 1979 and he died 21Nov1979 at Perth, WA, they left no children. Capt A.G.Bagot GC, DSC, R.N.V.R. was the first cousin of Maj L.G.Hawker VC, DSO, R.F.C.

Recommendation: In the attack on the enemy line East of Ville sur-Ancre on the 4th July 1919 this Officer was Artillery Forward Observer with the O.C. Attack and went forward with the first wave of the Infantry. The O.C. of the Company he was with was severely wounded and he himself much shaken by a shell in "No Mans Land" he went on however and reached the final objective. He then found that all the Officers except one in the Right Company were casualties and the enemy had commenced a counter attack on the Right Flank. With great determination and ability he assisted in re-organizing the Infantry and by his initiative and promptness the situation was restored and touch completed with the Infantry on the Left. He was instrumental from the moment of consolidation in getting valuable information back to his Headquarters both by Runner and Pigeons and throughout the day did valuable work in directing the supporting artillery fire and inspiring the Infantry with confidence. At about 8.45p.m. when the enemy counterattacked under a heavy barrage he again got information as to the position through promptly and was again of great value in assisting to organize the Infantry defence and keep touch between the various infantry Officers who were heavily engaged. He remained in the captured line until relieved at 1.40 a.m. on the following morning. He showed throughout bravery, energy and ability of the highest order and capacity for leadership.

Recommendation by M.Austin CO 1RAR: During the period 1st July 1952 to 31st December 1952 Lieutenant Burke has commanded over 20 fighting patrols. On 13/14 August 1952 he led his Platoon on a raid to GRAVE SPUR (CT134177). Two days later he commanded a similar raid to the same place. On both occasions he showed great audacity and determination in carrying out his task and maintained good control of his patrols through minefields which weren't accurately recorded. His actions were planned and rehearsed with the thoroughness characteristic of him, and carried out with aggressive determination.

During the course of a daylight patrol against the enemy at SANJOM-NI on 28 August 1952 Lieutenant Burke dispersed his men to covered positions, and then, under heavy and accurate fire, in full view of the enemy, went to the assistance of the wounded man. Regardless of personal danger from mortar bombs falling within a radius of 20 yards, this officer rendered first aid in the open. Twice he was forced to take cover but with complete courage he twice went back to complete first aid and assist the casualty. Realizing it would be fatal to drag or move the wounded man into a stretcher Lieutenant Burke remained for a further considerable time, still under fire, until the casualty could be moved under cover of smoke. This officer's quick action in dispersing his men kept casualties to a minimum, and his great personal courage in attending the casualty earned him the highest respect of his men. For his coolness, quick thinking and offensive spirit against the enemy it is recommended that this officer be Mentioned in Despatches.

Major Andrews, a medical doctor who was nearly 40 when he joined the second AIF in 1941 was appointed as a Major and posted to 10 Aust Gen Hosp. This unit was posted to Malaya in that year and subsequently most were captured during the Japanese invasion of Malaya and fall of Singapore. At the time, the Japanese had nearly 250,000 native labourers known as 'coolies' working on the Burma-Thailand Railway as well as 60,000 allied POWs. Many were dving of disease so the Japanese decided to send medical teams to Thailand and Burma. To this end they formed two forces known as K Force and L Force. In August 1943 Major Andrews went to Thailand as Senior Australian Medical Öfficer with L Force comprising of 42 British and 73 Australians including 15 medical officers. The senior officer was Lt Col H.C.B.Bebson RAMC, L Force and K Force, a similar but larger medical unit already sent in June 1943, were supposedly going to well equipped hospitals, however this was a misnomer. Some did go to hospital camps but most were dispatched as small medical teams amongst the 'coolies'. These teams were usually one medical officer, two medical orderlies, a cook and a carpenter.

During War Trials of Japanese officers following WWII, a sworn affidavit by Major Andrews re treatment of coolies and POWs at Nakon Nyok and Nikke in Thailand was used as evidence.

The Danish medal above was awarded to Danes serving in Allied Forces during WWII and foreigners for services towards the Danish war effort. The award was bestowed upon VFX126287 Cpl K.M.Christiansen by Royal Resolution of the 11th October 1954 and forwarded by F.Henning Hergel, Charge d'Affaires a.i. and Consul-General for Denmark at the Royal Danish Legation, Canberra, Australia.

Karen Margrethe Christiansen, children's nurse, age 33, born 11Jul1919 in Copenhagen, Denmark; Enl.17Apr1943 at Melbourne, Vic; Disch.09Mar1948 as Corporal ex AAMWS; performed full-time continuous war service from her date of enlistment, 25 Jan1943, until date of discharge, included in this service was operational service in the Northern Territory North of Latitude 14 degrees 30 minutes South between 21Feb1945 - 21Oct1945. The above medal group is the holder's full entitlement, even though there is no War Medal 1939-45. The group is an unique trio to a Danish-born Australian. Karen Christiansen was born in Denmark but was living in Australia when she enlisted in the Australian Army Medical Women's Service (service no.V506103) on 25 January 1943. Subsequently, on 6 April 1943 she received her Australian Citizenship and on 17 April she joined the 2nd AIF (service no.VFX126287).

After applying for her WWII service medals in 1947, Karen Christiansen received a letter from the Adjutant-General, Military Board, Australian Military Forces as follows,

'It is notified for your information in connection with the institution by the King of Denmark, of "King Christian the Tenth's Memorial Medal for Participation in the War 1940-45" that, following the practice observed by the Government of the United Kingdom, Danish Nationals serving in the Australian Forces will be eligible to receive the Danish Medal, or the British War Medal, but not both, in addition to any other British Campaign Stars or the Defence Medal, for which they have qualified.

It is understood that the Danish Consul General has been in touch with you in regard to this matter and it would be appreciated if you would advise this office as to whether you have elected to receive the Danish Medal or the British War Medal, by completing the proforma enclosed herewith, and returning same to this office.'

She replied stating that she was applying for the Australian Service Medal and forfeiting her right to the British War Medal. However she did not receive any further correspondence and then in 1954 she applied again for her medals. She was finally issued with her Australian medals on 23 February 1954 and the Danish medal was issued to Central Army Records on 30 November 1954 for issuing to her. The Secretariat of the Royal Orders (Denmark) confirmed her entitlement to the award and also that she was the only Australian recipient of this medal on record and was one of the last persons to receive it, being issued so long after it was announced.

There were only 905 of these Danish medals awarded and only one known to an Australian.

Emile Van Melle, Schepen Andrieeslaan 71, 9000 Gent, Dossier Ni.504.723 - As a freedom fighter in early 1941 was appointed as leader and organiser of several sections in Division of Leiestreek. Arrested 03Mar1943 by Gestapo being accused of being leader of the White Brigade active in the municipalities of Latem, Deurele & Drongen and took part in secret meetings as go-between at Gent - released after 6 weeks due to lack of evidence. After release was ill but continued underground activities until 08Jun1944 when again harassed by Gestapo and had to go underground until end of German occupation. As arranged by Ministry of Defence, underwent training in England as mechanic before returning to underground. On 08Jul1947 applied for invalid pension due to ill health caused by wartime activities, but rejected and as a result, there was a protracted appeal process that dragged on for years before qualifying for a war pension on 28Feb1968. The Department of Defence confirmed that Van Melle held the rank of Lieutenant in the underground movement.

Silver presentation baton, 1866, by Julius Hogarth, top end features a seated figure of Apollo with a lyre resting on his knee, below and around the circumference is a seated Aboriginal man, a kangaroo and an emu, below this is a scroll running around and down the baton and this is inscribed, 'Sydney Volunteer Military Band 1866', and the base is in the shape of an acorn. *Dent in tip of the acorn base, otherwise very fine and scarce piece of early Australiana by a talented and highly regarded master craftsman.*

A similar baton was presented by members of the Sydney Battalion Volunteer Rifles to their band director, Mr D.Callen, on 10 February 1863. In a newspaper article of the day the baton has the following description. 'Designed and executed by Mr. Julius Hogarth of Hunter - Street, which combines simplicity and elegance in a remarkable degree. At the upper-end is an exquisitely modelled figure of Apollo, seated, his famous Lyre on his knee. Immediately below, and in alto-rilievo around the staff, is an Aboriginal black, with an emu and kangaroo on either side. On a scroll, which runs spirally round the centre of the baton, is the following inscription... An acorn forms the lower end of the baton.'

Back of guard with loss of plating on engraved section and light rusting on some other areas, wear to plating on scabbard near top suspension ring and inscription on scabbard worn due to polishing, blade free of rust, overall fine and rare.

Henry George Chauvel was born at Tabulam, NSW, on 16 April 1865, his father being a grazier with a very large station of 96,000 acres running 12,000 head of cattle and 320 horses. From a young age he was known as Harry. He was educated at Mr Belcher's School near Goulburn, then at Sydney Grammar School from 1874-1880 where he served as a Lance Corporal with the cadet unit and Toowoomba Grammar School from 1881-1882. In 1886 he was commissioned as a Second Lieutenant in the Upper Clarence Light Horse, one of two units of cavalry that his father was given permission to form.

After suffering the effects of a series of severe droughts, in 1888 Harry's father sold the station and purchased a small farm of 12,000 acres at Canning Downs on the Darling Downs in Queensland. In 1889 Harry resigned his commission in the NSW Military Forces and embarked on a tour of Europe. On 9 January 1890 he was commissioned, once again as a Second Lieutenant, in the Queensland Mounted Infantry and in June 1890 was promoted to Lieutenant. In March 1891 his unit was called upon during the Australian shearers' strike. In 1896 he became a full-time regular officer with the Queensland Military Forces and was part of the Queensland Contingent to the 1897 Diamond Jubilee of Queen Victoria in the UK.

During the Boer War, Harry commanded a company of the Queensland Mounted Infantry with distinction. He was given a mixed nationality group of mounted troops and this became known as Chauvel's Mounted Infantry. For his services he was appointed a Companion of the Order of St Michael and St George (CMG) and mentioned in Despatches. By the time he had returned to Australia, now the Commonwealth of Australia after federation, he was an officer in the Australian Army. In 1902 he was appointed Lieutenant Colonel to command the 7th Commonwealth Light Horse raised for service in South Africa. Before the unit arrived in South Africa the war had finished. The unit returned home to be disbanded but Chauvel remained in South Africa to tour the battlefields. On his return he was appointed Staff Officer, Northern Military District. For the next several years he was moved to postings in various states mostly to implement various training aspects of the Army.

In 1913 he was promoted to Colonel and became the Australian representative on the Imperial General Staff in the UK. However, while he was en route to England, war broke out. Colonel Chauvel arranged for the AIF to be diverted to Egypt where in December of 1914 he joined his new command, the 1st Light Horse Brigade. In May 1915 he was sent to Gallipoli where he assumed responsibility for some of the dangerous areas of the campaign including Courtney's Post, Pope's Hill, Quinn's Post and Steele's Post from Colonel Monash. In November 1915 he assumed command of the 1st Division and then in March 1916 he was appointed commander of the Anzac Mounted Division. In 1917 this division achieved great victories in the Battle of Romani in August, the Battle of Magdhaba in December, and nearly won victory in the First Battle of Gaza in March 1917.

In April 1917, now Lt General Chauvel, he became the first Australian to control a Corps in WWI when he took control of the Desert Mounted Corps and in October he was responsible for the famous Charge at Beersheeba where his light horsemen captured the town and its vital water supply in one of the last great cavalry charges in history. His troops then launched a surprise attack on the enemy to win the Battle of Megiddo.

In 1919 Lt General Chauvel was honoured with the appointment to the Army's most senior post, Inspector General. In 1923 he also held concurrently the position of Chief of the General Staff. In 1929 he was appointed Australia's first full General and retired in 1930. In WWII he was recalled to duty as Inspector in Chief of the Volunteer Defence Corps. General Sir Henry George Chauvel GCMG, KCB died on 4 March 1945 and was given a State funeral at St Paul's Cathedral in Melbourne and later cremated at Springvale Crematorium with an important contingent of dignitaries and high ranking military personnel in attendance.
