Enlisted in SH (Steinaecker's Horse) at PMB (Pietermaritzburg) on 25 February 1902 - age 24, no occupation given, height 5'9 3 /4", dark eyes, grey hair, no marks. NOK: father, Bushnall, Illinois, USA. Discharged at his own request on 15 May 1902 after less than 3 months. No explanation found. He qualified for the QSA medal with clasps Cape Colony, OFS, Transvaal, SA 1901 & SA 1902. On 10 May 1907 the medal and clasps were sent to him at Fort Snelling, Minnesota, USA.'

He may be the C.Richardson who served as Corporal No.348 in the British South Africa Police during the Matabele rebellion in 1896 and again during the 1897 campaign in Rhodesia. Previous Anglo-Boer War service as Trooper No.90 in the Eastern Province Horse (17 months) and as Trooper No.831 in the Johannesburg Mounted Rifles. Enlisted in SH (Steinaecker's Horse) at PMB (Pietermaritzburg) on 5 October 1901 - clerk, age 23, height 5'7", grey eyes, fair hair, tattoos on both forearms, address: Durban. NOK: father, Turnbridge Wells, Kent. Discharged at Komati Poort on 7 February 1903 following disbandment of the regiment. He qualified for the QSA medal with clasps Cape Colony, OFS & Transvaal and his KSA with the two date clasps was issued from the SH roll.'

There was an Australian named Walter John Hennett born at Emerald Hill, Victoria who died on 20 May 1939 at Hawthorn, Victoria and his funeral notice stated 'late South African Scottish Horse'. It is unknown whether this is the same Walter John Hennett as the above medal recipient.

Attested in SH (Steinaecker's Horse) at PMB (Pietermaritzburg) on 3 June 1901 - miner, height 6'1 «", blue eyes, brown hair. NOK: father W.H.Willard at Bridport St, Daylesford, Victoria. Discharged time expired at PMB on 16 September 1902 after the cessation of hostilities. Qualified for the QSA medal with clasps Transvaal, SA 1901 & SA 1902.'

There was also a Wilfred (Willy) Edward Buckeridge who died 21Mar1911 on the passenger ship, R.M.S.Orvieto. Further research needed.

William N.G.Garland, 43rd Regiment Enl.21Jan1859 at Dublin, Centre District as Boy recruit; to Private 24Mar1859; at 43rd Regt Depot at Chatham Apr-Jul1860; Emb.07Jul1860 for India on ship 'Holmsdale'; joined 43rd Regt at Fort St George, Madras 09Oct1860; Appt'd Bugler 28Feb1861; to New Zealand and service in field from 11Dec1863; fought in actions at Gate Pa 29Apr1864, Te Ranga 21Jun1864 and Taranaki District (3 skirmishes); with 43rd Regt at Aldershot Jul-Sep1867; Displaced as Bugler and to Private 10Jul1867; with 43rd Regt in Ireland and promoted to Corporal 18Jun1870; at School of Musketry, Hythe 01Apr-31May1871; to Sergeant 21Apr1872; Col-Sergeant attached to depot of 52nd Light Infantry Jul-Sep1872, and at Malleapooram Jan-Mar1873; Col-Sergeant with 43rd Regt Apr1876-Mar1877; to RSM 19Sep1877; no Muster Rolls available between 1883-1887 but appears to have discharged in this period; according to the late W.Woolmore's research Garland then emigrated to Australia and joined the Victorian Local Forces as a Warrant Officer.

A.W.Buckingham' sold at auction conducted by Sotheby, Wilkinson & Hodge on 28 -29 June 1904. Perhaps this is that medal?

Brigadier General Henry Jenkins Brock CB, CMG, DSO, brother of Admiral Sir Osmond de Beauvoir Brock GCB, KCMG, KCVO and son of Commander Osmond de Beauvoir Brock RN. He was born 17 April 1870 and educated at Halebury College and the Royal Military Academy at Woolwich, England. He entered the Royal Artillery in 1889. In the Anglo-Boer War he commanded the Colonial Horse and later a Column. He was severely wounded in action at Tabaksburg on 29 January 1901. He was awarded a QSA with three clasps and a KSA with two clasps. In WWI he was Mentioned in Despatches five times and was also awarded DSO LG 1Jan1917, CMG in 1918 and CB in 1919. He retired in 1922 and died on 8 September 1933.

Vernon Harridge Edwards was born on 20 July 1866, at Brighton, South Australia, the eldest son of the late Mr Henry Edwards, a farmer and grazier. During 1882-3 he accompanied Ernest Giles F.R.G.S. on an exploration expedition into the interior of Australia. Then in 1884 he joined the Garrison Artillery at Largs Bay and Adelaide as a Gunner. His service from then is set out above. When he went to the war in South Africa his first appointment was with Colonel De Lisle's column until he contracted enteric fever and was invalided home. After recovering he returned to South Africa and was posted to the staff of General Sir Henry Settle at Cape Town. He was then sent as Chief Staff Officer to Colonel White's column operating in Namaqualand District. Major Edwards was twice Mentioned in Despatches, first by the officer commanding the Namaqualand District and then by Lord Kitchener. He then had a roving commission in the Intelligence Department.

After peace was declared, Major Edwards was appointed Permit Officer for East London and then returned to South Australia in 1902 and was placed on the Unattached List the following year. In his civilian life he had started work in the Land Titles Office in September 1883. When he returned from South Africa he resumed work with the Land Titles Office and in June 1904 he was appointed Deputy Registrar.

At the Battle of Trafalgar HMS Bellerophon or 'Billy Ruffian' as she was known among the lower deck, sailed in the lee division. Inspired by Nelson's signal that 'England expects every man will do his duty', her gun crews chalked on the ship's gun barrels, 'Bellerophon: Death or Glory'. Nelson formed his fleet into two divisions; the weather column would attack to the north under his direct command and the lee column would operate to the south under the command of Cuthbert Collingwood in HMS Royal Sovereign. The Bellerophon under command of Captain John Cooke was stationed fifth in Collingwood's line, and so was one of the first ships engaged in action with the combined fleet. Cooke had reportedly been extremely concerned for his safety prior to the battle, and took the unusual step of informing his first lieutenant, William Pryce Cumby, and his master, Edward Overton, of Nelson's orders, in case he should be killed.

Bellerophon was soon closely engaged with the French, breaking through the enemy line and closing with Aigle. As with the other French ships in the fleet, Aigle's rigging and mastheads were occupied by musketeers and grenadiers, who kept up a steady fire on Bellerophon and took a heavy toll of sailors exposed on the British ship's deck. Much of the fire was directed at the quarterdeck, where Cooke, Cumby and Overton stood. Cumby noted with surprise that Cooke was still wearing his uniform coat, which sported epaulettes that marked him out as the ship's captain to French snipers. Cooke had forgotten to remove the epaulettes and recognised the danger they represented, but replied 'It is too late to take them off. I see my situation, but I will die like a man.' As the action continued, the captain of Aigle ordered his crew to board and seize Bellerophon, hoping to use their superiority of numbers to overwhelm the British crew.

Cooke sent Cumby below to make sure that the lower deck guns continued to fire into the French ship as the battle continued overhead, and threw himself at the French sailors pouring onto Bellerophon's quarterdeck, shooting an enemy officer dead and engaging in hand-to-hand combat with the men behind him. Within minutes Cumby had returned to the deck with reinforcements from below, passing the mortally wounded Overton on the ladder. The badly wounded ship's quartermaster was also present, and he informed Cumby that Cooke had fallen in the melee. Cumby's charge cleared the French from the deck of Bellerophon, and he found Captain Cooke dead on the quarterdeck, two musket balls lodged in his chest. Cooke's last words had been 'Let me lie quietly a minute. Tell Lieutenant Cumby never to strike.'

Cumby took charge of the battered Bellerophon, directing her fire into Aigle and ultimately forcing the French ship's surrender after the arrival of other British vessels. Bellerophon had suffered grievously, losing 27 dead and 127 wounded. Although Aigle was lost in the chaotic storm which followed the battle, Bellerophon survived, primarily due to Cumby's leadership. He was later promoted to captain for his services in the action. Cooke's body was buried at sea the day after the battle with the other fatal casualties from Bellerophon.

One of the convoy, the Rohna, was hit by a glider bomb and she was abandoned and sank with the loss of over 1,000 American troops out of 2,000 being transported as well as 5 officers and 115 Asiatic ratings of her crew of 195. A second attack was launched on 29 November north of Benghazi when 15 Ju88s dive bombed the convoy. Ranchi was struck with a bomb forward which went through the wooden deck house, through the deck and cut through the side before exploding. One soldier was killed and three wounded. James Molyneux's DSM was the only award from this action.

After serving in the Boer War, Patrick was successful in drawing a selection of land in the Longreach area of Queensland. Later he sold it and purchased hotels in Longreach and Rockhampton. He never married and lived at the hotels with his sister. His brother, Michael, was an Alderman at Rockhampton and later moved to Sydney, NSW. Patrick died in a private hospital in Rockhampton in 1937 after a long and painful illness. His funeral service was held at St Vincent's Church, Wandall and he was buried at the Rockhampton Cemetery.

Charles Edward Holmes was killed as the result of an accident on board the Royal Australian Navy's first flagship, HMAS Australia. The following report was published in The Argus newspaper in Melbourne, Thursday 21 August 1913, p6.

'A cable message from Cape Town yesterday conveyed the news that the first fatal accident had occurred on board the Commonwealth flagship Australia, shortly after the new Dreadnought left Cape St. Vincent. Petty Officer Charles Edward Holmes was the victim, a derrick falling on his head. Unusual interest attaches to the accident, owing to the fact that the unfortunate young sailor was well known in naval and military circles here. He was only 30 years of age, and a resident of Twyford Street, Williamstown where he leaves a new wife and two young children to mourn their loss.

The late Petty Officer Holmes, in the capacity of a bugler boy, went to China with the Victorian Contingent at the time of the Boxer Rebellion serving under Captain Tickell. On returning he joined the Victorian naval forces and gained the rank of Seaman. Subsequently Petty Officer Holmes served in the Royal Australian Garrison Artillery, being stationed at Queenscliff, showing special ability in handling the little steam launch Mars. When the Australian naval service was made especially attractive, Holmes again enlisted and formed a member of the crew of the destroyer Parramatta. He afterwards went to England to obtain experience prior to joining the Australian flagship.'

#### PRESENTATION OF CHINA WAR MEDALS.

On Saturday afternoon, His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor distributed the medals and gratuities awarded by the Admiralty to the officers and men of H.M.C.S. Protector who served on the China Station during the war of 1900. The function was held in the Port Adelaide Town Hall. Sir Samuel Way, in making the presentations, spoke eulogistically of the patriotism of the Ministry and people of South Australia in dispatching the Protector and her crew to China, of the gallantry of those who accompanied the vessel, and of the good impression created upon the Naval Commander-in-Chief (Admiral Seymour). His Excellency handed the medals to the recipients. (News report lists W.H.Ticklie as one of the recipients.)

On the death of Henry Ticklie, the following article was published in the Glenelg Guardian on Thursday 5 May 1927, p2.

#### 'OBITUARY

#### MR. HENRY WILLIAM TICKLIE

The death occurred on Tuesday, April 26, of Mr. Henry William Ticklie, of 10 Kent Street, Glenelg. Mr. Ticklie was born at Encounter Bay 43 years ago and joined the Navy when quite young. He was chosen as bugler for the Naval Guard of Honor during the visit to Australia of King George and Queen Mary as the Duke and Duchess of York. He also visited China during the Boxer rising as a member of the crew of H.M.S. "Protector." In 1900 he left the navy and took up his residence in Glenelg, where he followed a seafaring life and by his cheery and kindly disposition he made a large circle of friends. In 1919 he married Lydia, the second daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Thos. Virgo of Hamlev Bridge, who survives him.'

On 26 April 1937 his wife, Lydia, posted a notice in The Advertiser, Adelaide - 'Fond remembrance of my beloved husband, Henry W. Ticklie. Called home, 26th April, 1927. Ten years of loving memories.'

The Commendation for Brave Conduct was originally in the form of a card certificate as in this lot. From 1943 a pin-back plastic badge was initiated for civilian recipients and from 1946 this was replaced by a silver metal laurel leaf for civilians and a bronze oak leaf issued to armed forces personnel including merchant seamen.

Lieutenant Commander Mould's group of eight medals were sold by his family after his death in 1957. They were then auctioned in Brisbane in 2004 for a world record price of \$440,000 to a private Brisbane investor.

John Stuart Mould, naval officer and architect, was born on 21 March 1910 at Gosforth, Northumberland, England, His family emigrated to Australia when he was only two years old. He was educated at Sydney Grammar School and then attended university in London and on graduation became an associate of the Royal Institute of British Architects in 1934. He then returned to Sydney and joined his father in private practice.

On 14 June 1940 John Mould enlisted in the 2/AIF. He contracted bronchial pneumonia and, while recuperating, he qualified through the Yachtsmen Scheme for appointment as sub lieutenant, Royal Australian Naval Volunteer Reserve. He discharged from the AIF and was mobilized in the RANVR on 14 September 1940 and sent to England for training at HMS King Alfred. Along with Hugh Syme, H.D. Reid and J.H.H. Kessack, he volunteered for 'special duties ashore'-service in the Royal Navy's specialist section, Rendering Mines Safe. He was provisionally promoted lieutenant in December 1940 and posted to HMS Vernon.

The RMS section had been established to assist in disarming the large number of unexploded bombs and mines spread across Britain by German aircraft. Although most of the work involved bombs, the RMS's naval personnel were primarily concerned with 'delousing' German sea mines which had been dropped on land or washed ashore. John Mould performed outstanding work on dock clearance operations and those resulting in the stripping of the early German mine Type G. He received a commendation for bravery in June 1941 (the above certificate) and was awarded the George Medal in April 1942.

Among numerous assignments, Mould recovered, rendered safe and investigated the first German magnetic acoustic unit and moored magnetic mine. The successful dismantling of such weapons allowed British scientists to identify their triggering mechanisms and thus devise countermeasures in addition to the usual hazards of handling explosives, Mould and his colleagues had to contend with booby traps set to detonate the mines if attempts were made to disarm and disassemble them. In November 1942 he was awarded the George Cross for 'great gallantry and devotion to duty'.

Promoted acting lieutenant commander in January 1943, he began work with Professor Jack Haldane to develop a diving-suit with an independent air supply. Later that year Mould, together with Lieutenant Leon Goldsworthy, RANVR, and Lieutenant Commander J. L. Harries, Royal Canadian Navy, trained groups of men known as 'P' parties in preparation for the invasion of Western Europe. These units were intended to be dispatched to newly captured harbours to clear them of booby traps, mines and other obstructions. Mould was given the opportunity to command one of the parties but instead chose to continue training men who would serve in them.

After the German surrender in May 1945, Mould was sent to Ceylon and Australia to assess the need for 'P' parties in the Far East and Pacific theatres and was assigned as commander of two of the parties about the time that World War II ended. Mould's RANVR appointment terminated on 26 November 1945 while he was in Britain and he got a position as an architect with the allied military government in Germany and helped with that country's reconstruction.

John Mould returned to Australia in 1948 and after working as an architect with the Department of Public Works, he was appointed chief architect to the Housing Commission of New South Wales in 1950. There was a big parade of all arms at the Victoria Barracks on Saturday afternoon, when the Lieut.-Governor presented long service and meritorious service medals to members of the military force. The voluntary parade was held under Major Boam, at 5 o'clock, and subsequently the Lieut.-Governor, accompanied by Captain H. Darley, A.D.C., and Miss Darley arrived. The Premier (Mr. John See), Major-General French, Surgeon-General Williams, Colonel Taunton, and others were among the large concourse of spectators. Prior to his making the presentations the men were addressed by Sir Frederick Darley, who expressed the pleasure it afforded him to be present and distribute the different classes of medals, officers' decorations, and a life-saving award. His Excellency said he had taken great interest in the defence forces of the State since 1866, when the English Government saw fit to withdraw its forces.' One of the Long Service Medal recipients was Sgt George Gilbert of Newcastle, a member of the NSW Artillery (Garrison).

#### LENGTHY OFFICIAL CAREER

#### RETIREMENT OF A POLICE OFFICER

Sergeant George Fay, of Rockhampton, has received notification of his retirement on pension after 31 years of faithful service in the Queensland Police Force, (says the "Record"). It may be mentioned that before a police officer is allowed to leave the service on pension he must have served at least 30 years in the force, or be recommended as unfit for service by the Medical Board, and he must, during that period, have served faithfully and well, and had no "black marks" allowed against his name.

Joining the force as an ordinary constable in Brisbane on January 25, 1879, Sergeant Fay did street duty, subsequently going into the C.I. Branch in Brisbane. After a couple of years' service in this Department, Sergeant Fay received his first promotion, being made an Acting-Sergeant in charge of section duty. So successful was this police official, that he was given charge of the inquiry branch into deaths and fires for the whole of the metropolitan area. During the 1893 flood in Brisbane, Sergeant Fay was a conspicuous from the then Commissioner of Police, and the present Home Secretary, as Chairman of the Hamilton Shire Council. After 14 years duty in the Brisbane district, Sergeant Fay was transferred to Ipswich, and after seven years' stay in that city, he was transferred to Maryborough.

During his residence there, Sergeant Fay received further promotion to the position of Sergeant. In 1903, Sergeant Fay received travelling orders to Rockhampton, and here he has remained ever since. The retiring Sergeant has been recognised as a very capable police officer, and one who was never afraid to do his duty. He was well liked among his fellow officers, and his departure from among the "boys in blue" will be greatly missed. Sergeant Fay's retirement from the force which is entirely at his own request, dates as from April 1st and it is his intention to reside in Brisbane, where his family is resident at the present moment.

The following article was published in The Brisbane Courier, Queensland on Monday 26 December 1927, p13.

The death is announced at Auckland, N.Z. of Colonel John Henry Alexander Lee familiarly known as "Sapper" Lee, and formerly at the Australian regular forces, at the age of 74 years. The name of Colonel Lee will not be confused with that of General George Lee C.M.G., D.S.O., who was commandant in Queensland for several years. The late Colonel Lee was for many years officer commanding the submarine miners in New South Wales.

He first joined the service in 1888, and retired in 1911. He was well known in Sydney and performed valuable work in organising the submarine mining station at Chowder Bay to a high state of efficiency. Some time prior to his retirement he was appointed commandant in South Australia and held that position when he retired with the honorary rank of colonel. He saw service in the South African war and received the Queen's medal with three clasps. He also performed home service during the Great War.



O'Bern displayed the utmost courage and devotion in assisting three artillery drivers who were severely wounded by a large calibre shell bursting amongst both horses and men. The enemy had set up a heavy barrage fire, in spite of which this Officer extricated the men from the horses, rendered first aid, and helped them to a place of safety. This is the second occasion Lieut. O'Bern's name has been brought to notice for similar actions.

There is another recommendation also for Lt A.T.Cunningham, Machine Gun Squadron, 2nd Australian Light Horse Brigade which states, 'Recommended for consistent gallant and good work and devotion to duty. He has been 3 times previously recommended for gallantry in the Field.'

Captain A.T.Cunningham was court martialled for 'Conduct to the prejudice of good order and Military Discipline in that, at the Continental Hotel, Cairo, at about 11pm on the 10th June 1918 did insult Mr Mikabbaty, a member of the Legislative Assembly of Egypt, by knocking his tarboush (sic, tarboosh) off his head.' He was found guilty, severely reprimanded and the date of his appointment as Captain was adjusted from 28Feb1917 to 28Feb1918.

Andrew Twynam Cunningham was educated at Geelong Grammar School where he excelled in sports, particularly football and rowing. After completing school he took an agricultural course at the University of Sydney where he developed his rowing skills, stroking the junior eights in 1910 and the senior fours in 1911. In 1912 he stroked the senior eights in the inter-varsity matches and the Sydney crew was the leading crew in the Commonwealth. Andy was assured a place on the Australian team for the 1912 Olympics but he passed up the opportunity to return home and assist with managing the family Tuggeranong estate.

After his war service he returned home to a large community welcome and due to his father's ill-health he had to manage the family properties. He did manage time to play polo and mainly due to his efforts the local polo club which had been closed during the war was reformed. Andy also regularly got up to some crazy antics when he would go into town for a drink with the boys including some friendly punch-ups and on one occasion he rode his horse into a local shop and into the hotel. After his father died and Andy finalised the estate he purchased three local properties.

Andy was also interested in aviation and trained as a pilot with the aero club in Sydney and then became a pioneer of aviation in the Queanbeyan-Canberra district. In 1929 Andy entered the Sydney to Perth Air Race and flying his Gypsy Moth that he named 'Orroral Dingo' he finished in third place despite having a few forced landings due to mechanical problems. Then in 1930 he embarked on a solo flight to England, the first of its kind. He made it through the Dutch East Indies, Singapore and finally Burma but because of persistent engine problems he had to abandon his venture. He sold his properties in 1935 and retired to Sydney where he bought a sea-going yacht which he regularly sailed along the coast. In February 1959 he was travelling by car with his sister Joan and on the Sturt Highway near Euston in Victoria their car overturned. He suffered severe injuries and became a paraplegic. Some months later he was transferred to the Prince of Wales Hospital at Randwick in Sydney where he died on 19 August 1959 at the age of 67.

Note: In 1916 the Commonwealth Government resumed the Tuggeranong homestead of the Cunningham family and in 1919 Charles Bean and his war history team set about compiling the Official History of WWI, a project that would last more than 5 years.

Recommendation: This officer was in charge of a Section of Trench Mortars during the enemy attack on the Railway Arch, Dernancourt, on 8th April, 1918. He rendered great assistance to the defence by the manner in which he handled his guns, observing their fire, and helping with the ammunition. He remained covering the withdrawal of the Infantry from the Railway line to the supporting posts, and then destroyed his guns to prevent their falling into enemy hands. Later, under heavy enemy Machine Gun fire, he reorganised his own men and infantry in his vicinity, and took part in repelling the subsequent enemy attacks on the new line.

By prompt and vigorous action he inflicted sufficient casualties to force them to withdraw, and succeeded in cutting off one German who was later made prisoner by our nearest post. The information resulting from this and other patrols led by Sgt. Day proved of great value in locating definitely the position of enemy posts prior to the attack of 20.9.17

Recommendation: For most conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty during the attack near Beaurevoir, East of Peronne, on 4th Oct., 1918. When a large gap was caused through casualties he reorganised the nearest sections and restored the line. On arrival at the objectives he headed the mopping-up parties and bayoneted three of the enemy who refused to surrender. He then collected a small party and pushed out in front, covering the digging of our new posts, and causing the enemy severe losses by skilfully controlling the fire of his men. Throughout he proved himself a gallant and dashing leader and displayed the greatest daring and resource.

Soon after our Barrage opened, a heavy counter-barrage was put down close to the Battery; two of Sgt. Jane's detachment were casualties, but with great coolness and courage this N.C.O. though short-handed, and under heavy shell-fire, continued to work his gun, so that although a difficult creeping barrage was being fired, not a round was missed and continuous fire maintained.

Shortly afterwards this N.C.O. was himself severely wounded in the arm; but still continued to work the gun, though weak and dazed; it was only on the receipt of a direct order from an Officer that he would consent to leave his gun and hand over his barrage sheet to another N.C.O. This N.C.O. set a conspicuous example of consummate coolness and courage, and displayed a very high devotion to duty in the face of most trying and dangerous circumstances.

When the objective was reached it was found that several Lewis Guns had not come up owing to their carriers becoming casualties. With another man, Warren went back and searched the ground traversed by his Company, recovering three guns from our dead and wounded, and bringing them on to the captured trench. While doing this he was under the heaviest fire and his companion was killed, but Warren showed absolute coolness and resolution. This man's magnificent work inspired his whole Company. (The above named has not been recommended in connection with the New Year's Honours Despatch).

Recommendation by Major V.Moates, Lt.Col. 6th Army Bde, A.F.A: This N.C.O. was an original member of this Battery and has never been away from it. Throughout his service he has done excellent work, and exhibited great willingness and devotion to duty.

On the 7th August 1918 when packing ammunition to a forward position in Villers Bretonneaux he displayed great pluck and determination throughout the night under constant hostile artillery and machine gun fire. His coolness and disregard of danger being very noticeable. On the night of October 8th 1918 at Ramicourt when taking up ammunition to the guns, the column came under severe hostile bombing, causing casualties and confusion. This N.C.O. showed coolness and great courage and rendered material assistance to the Officer in charge in restoring the position.

At St. Souplet on October 17th 1918 he showed great energy and determination in getting his gun forward under heavy hostile fire in a fog when his battery had to advance during a barrage. His high minded sense of duty and bravery have been very praiseworthy.

There were only 6 awards of the Romanian Croix de Virtue Militaria to the AIF in WWI and William Smith's award is only one of two with a recorded recommendation.



After Lt-Gen Wynter's death the following tribute was published in The Argus (Melbourne), Thursday 8 February 1945, p5.

#### 'Distinguished Military Career

Lieut-General H. D. Wynter, CB, CMG, DSO, former GOC Eastern Command, and later lieutenant-general in charge of administration at Land Headquarters, Melbourne, died yesterday at Heidelberg Military Hospital, after a long illness. He was 58, and had a distinguished career as a permanent soldier.

Lieut-General Henry Douglas Wynter, a native of Queensland, joined the militia when he was 21, and began as a second lieutenant in the Wide Bay Infantry Regiment. He reached the rank of captain in the militia, and in 1911 transferred to the permanent forces as a lieutenant. In the last war he joined the AIF, with which he served in France, most of the time on General Birdwood's staff, and reached the rank of lieutenant-colonel. From June to November, 1919, he was OC, AIF troops in France and Flanders. In the interval between the two wars he was Director of Mobilisation and Director of Military Training. After the outbreak of the present war he was appointed GOC, Northern Command, and District Commandant of the First Military District.

In April, 1940, he joined the Second AIF with the rank of brigadier, and soon afterwards left for service overseas. On his arrival in Britain he was promoted major-general, and appointed Commandant, AIF HQ in Britain, with the temporary command of the whole of the Australian forces in Britain. In October, 1940, he took command of the newly formed 9th Australian Division, but after a short term in the Middle East he was compelled by ill-health to relinquish his command and return to Australia. In December, 1941, he was promoted lieutenant general, and appointed GOC, Eastern Command. He became lieutenant general, Administration, Land Headquarters, in April, 1942.

He is survived by his wife (formerly Miss Ethel May White) and two sons, one of whom, Philip, is a war correspondent. The burial will be at Springvale Cemetery, with military honours.'

Frank Cridland's son also served with the AIF as No.5375 Driver A.W.Cridland AASC. Another of his sons was Captain Walter D.Cridland RAA who was killed in action in Borneo on 27 June1945 and another was Flight Lieutenant Alan Cridland who was killed at Darwin in November 1942.

On 18 October 1920 Mr Frank Cridland CBE was congratulated on the honour of the award of a CBE at a meeting at the rooms of the Master Carriers' Association of which he was president. Mr Cridland responding said the honour was not so much for him as for the association, the members of which had done such valuable work during the war. He is remembered amongst Shire residents as the author of 'The Story of Port Hacking, Cronulla and Sutherland Shire' (1924 & 1950).

Frank Cridland CBE died on 28 May 1954 at the age of 81. He founded the transport business of Frank Cridland Pty Ltd, was a foundation member of the Legacy Club of NSW, a life member of the Royal Australian Historical Society, a member of the Fellowship of Australian Writers and of the Imperial Service Club. His funeral service was conducted on 31 May at Woronora Cemetery.

It is interesting to note that the Victory Medal has a slightly different surface and is struck on a thinner blank.

He then remained in the shell hole with his men - his cheerfulness and high spirits having a wonderful affect in keeping up their courage and spirits.

On the 12th his Battalion was in Reserve but was quickly absorbed as reinforcements owing to very heavy casualties. The various units had become mixed up and many Officers had become casualties so that it needed vigorous action by a senior Officer on the spot to re-organise. This task was carried out admirably by Lt.Col. Henderson in spite of the great difficulty due to marshy nature of the ground and to the heavy enemy shell fire and perfect hail of machine gun bullets which were enflading the position. His example was a great incentive to all troops not only of his own but of other units.


Flying Officer Curr was flying a non-operational Tiger Moth flight from 33Sqn, Milne Bay between Daru at Papua and Horn Island with Army Warrant Officer II N.D.Kellas (VX75426) of ANGAU (Australian New Guinea Administrative Unit) as a passenger when the aircraft and both men vanished without trace on the night of 24 September 1944, both men presumed dead. It was noted that the aircraft had been delayed due to a serviceability problem, and it had no flotation gear and only one parachute. Flying Officer Curr's family, with the approval of the Australian Prime Minister, offered a five hundred pounds reward to anyone who located his body but it was never found. Both men are commemorated at the Port Moresby Memorial, PNG.

After Flt Sgt Curr was awarded the DFM, the following was reported in The Telegraph (Brisbane, Qld) on 27 October 1942, p4.

'Flight-Sergeant Frank Curr, RAAF, who is attached to a New Zealand Wellington bomber squadron, has been awarded the Distinguished Flying Medal. He has carried out 64 raids, 50 of them in the Middle East, has sunk three ships, and has once bombed Naples.

#### Group to Fighter Pilot





Then, after he was awarded a Bar to his DFM, the following was reported in the Truth (Brisbane, Qld) on Sunday 28 February 1943, p9.

'LONDON, Saturday. - You've heard of Pilot-Officer "Screwball" Buerling, D.S.O., D.F.C., D.F.M., famous Canadian fighter ace, who shot down, some 28 Jerry kites over Malta. But maybe you don't know that the Bomber Command has its own "Buerling" also; he is Warrant-Officer Francis Lawrence Kerr (sic), D.F.M. and Bar, of Toowoomba. Kerr's (sic) record is outstanding. Like Buerling, he is no spick and span, immaculately dressed pilot, who looks as if he's just walked out of a tailor's shop, but is a somewhat untidy individual, with the same disregard for the usual Air Force conventions which Buerling displayed.

But he's a great pilot, utterly fearless, and possessed of grim determination. He lives for his job of bombing, as Buerling lived for his job of fighting. And he holds a record unequalled among R.A.A.F. bomber boys, for he's made something like 78 operational sorties, which is 20 or 30 more than any other Aussie serving in this theatre has to his credit, and a record which few British airmen have eclipsed.

There is a Squadron Leader who made over 100 raids, and an English airgunner who has carried out 110, but only a mere handful of airmen have topped Kerr's (sic) total. He has served in the Middle East, and later joined a New Zealand "Wimpey" squadron in Britain. He was awarded the D.F.M. last October, the citation specifically mentioning his "outstanding courage" and energetic devotion to duty, and when he recently added a bar to it his "utter fearlessness" was again stressed.

He is now serving with an R.A.F. Pathfinder Squadron, but would be an ideal man for the R.A.A.F. to take back to Australia in order to tell the people what the Australians in the B.A.F. (British Armed Forces) are doing over here. He knows that story intimately, and has written many of its chapters himself.'

During pilot training with 4 EFTS at Randwick Racecourse on 23Jan1942 while flying a Tiger Moth A17-144, LAC R.K.Pilling made a forced landing. The airscrew stopped on loop; trainee advised to restart but was unsuccessful so made a forced landing approach. He undershot by 2 feet and undercarriages struck top of inner boundary railing; aircraft overturned and top mainplanes, undercarriage and airscrew damaged as the result of poor technique due to inexperience.

Also, while piloting a Hurricane Aircraft No. KX.174 he had an accident at RAF Station, Ranchi, India on 5Feb1945 in that he failed to ensure that his taxying path was clear before commencing to taxy his aircraft. He was found negligent and his punishment was that WOFF Pilling take rank and precedence in the Air Force as if his appointment to the rank of WOFF bore the date 7/11/45.

Ronald Keith Pilling, rent collecting and general office work and formerly a student at The Scots College, Sydney, age 18, born at Marrickville, Sydney, NSW; Enl.15Aug1941 at No.2 Recruiting Centre, Sydney as AC2, with previous experience as Cpl with College Cadet Corps; to LAC 08Nov1941; to Sgt 24Jun1942; Emb.24Aug1942; to Flt/Sgt 07Aug1943; applied for emergency commission on 08Jun1944; an assessment of his service with 258 Sqn was that he not be commissioned because - 'This N.C.O. has been with the Squadron a very short time. He is entirely devoid of a sense of responsibility and leadership. Maj-Gen Noel W.Simpson CB, CBE, DSO, ED was referred to as the 'The Red Fox', a sobriquet arising from the emblem painted on his bren-gun carrier. His twin brother, Maj Grosvenor Harry Simpson, was killed at Anzio, Italy on 31 May 1944.

Noel completed his schooling at North Sydney Boys' High School and then started work at the National Bank of Australasia on 27 December 1922. After joining the militia in 1925 he was commissioned an officer in March 1926 and by August 1930 he had been promoted to Captain. Just after World War II started he was a temporary Major in the 45th Battalion but on 6 May 1940 he enlisted in the AIF. He embarked for service in the Middle East as Major with 2/33 Battalion and part of his service included the Syrian campaign and as Lt-Colonel was in command of 2/17 Battalion at the battle of El Alamein. He was rewarded for his outstanding leadership with the award of the Distinguished Service Order.

He returned to Australia with his unit and after further training they were deployed to Lae and then Finschhafen in New Guinea, both under Japanese control. Simpson was wounded during the advance at Finschhafen but continued to lead his men in the advance along the Huon Peninsula. His unit inflicted heavy casualties on the enemy in the Kumawa area and then successfully defended Jivevenang Ridge for over two weeks and this operation was vital in the future campaign at Sattelberg. Lt-Col.Simpson was awarded a Bar to his DSO for these operations.

During the next few months he commanded the 24th and 20th Brigades, rejoined the 2/17th Battalion and then retrained the 2/43rd Battalion and then appointed temporary Brigadier before leading the 29th Brigade in March 1945 for an operation in Bougainville. This operation was put on hold due to torrential rain and by the time the weather improved the war had ended. After the war Simpson was put on the Reserve of Officers and returned to work at the National Bank although he remained in service with the Citizen's Military Forces commanding the 6th Brigade and later the 3rd Division as a temporary major-general. Also, in 1950 he was Honorary Aide-de-Camp for the 2nd Military District to His Excellency The Governor-General of Australia, Sir William McKell (CAG No.14, 16March 1950, p631).

Noel William Simpson was appointed a Commander of the British Empire in 1956 as a brigadier and in 1963 a Companion of the Order of the Bath as a major-general. In 1960-62 he was the CMF representative of the Military Board, the highest position open to a part-time officer. He retired from army service on 23 February 1964 and then after nearly ten years as an assistant inspector with the National Bank he retired in 1966. He died in hospital from a heart attack five years later.

In January 1945, Flight Lieutenant Bache piloted an aircraft in an attack on the Dortmund-Ems Canal. When nearing the target the aircraft was hit in one of the wings and in the bomb bay by shrapnel. In spite of this, Flight Lieutenant Bache went on to execute a good bombing run. Shortly afterwards the aircraft was again hit. The port inner engine caught fire and the propeller had to be feathered. The port outer engine was also damaged. One of the petrol tanks was punctured and its contents drained away. Other damage, which affected control of the aircraft, was also sustained. Height was lost rapidly and Flight Lieutenant Bache experienced the greatest difficulty in retaining control. Nevertheless he was determined, if possible, to reach the Allied lines. The damaged port engine now failed completely. Still, this resolute pilot held on. As he passed over the Rhine defences at a low altitude his aircraft came under considerable light anti-aircraft fire and was hit in many places. Nevertheless Flight Lieutenant Bache reached the Allied lines before ordering his crew to abandon aircraft. Not until they were clear, did he himself jump. He was then so low, that as he got clear of the crashing aircraft, he struck the top of a tree almost as his parachute opened. This officer displayed exemplary conduct in the face of great danger and the ultimate safety of his crew was undoubtedly due to his skill, bravery and resolution.

Hassler has made a hand-written note to the affect that he thought that he should receive the Pacific Star but he never proceeded to request same. His Flying Log Book seems to verify his assertion. Further, in his Service File is an advice dated 31 May 1946 of his medal entitlement on demobilisation at 7 March 1946 and this includes the Pacific Star but no Defence Medal. However, the printed and hand-completed medal advice supplied with his late issued medals only has the above five medals in his group listed. If further investigation reveals that he is in fact entitled to the Pacific Star then the problem can be rectified easily.

# PILOT OF VAMPIRE JET WAS KNOWN IN KEMPSEY

Fl.-Lt. Peter Cooney, pilot of the Vampire jet which, with a Mustang fighter, disappeared north of Newcastle on Wednesday, was a son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas F. Cooney, of East Maitland, both of whom are well-known to many residents in Kempsey, and on the Macleay.

On Saturday, wreckage, believed from the planes, was found as far north as Forster, many miles north of where the planes were believed to have collided in mid-air and crashed into the sea. Mr. Thomas F. Cooney, the father of Fl.-Lt. Cooney, was an officer in the Land Board Office at Kempsey over thirty years ago; and his mother, then Miss Muriel Blanchard, was a popular and well respected member of the West Kempsey school staff. Mr. L. L. Blanchard, ex-Inspector of Police, of Tozer St., West Kempsey, is an uncle of the missing pilot.

The late Fl.-Lt. Peter Cooney, 31, married, was attached to the R.A.A.F. Station, Williamtown. He joined the Air Force on his 18th birthday, and had three years of war service as a bomber pilot. After the war he went to the United States for a course of instruction in Neptune bombers, and he was a pilot on one of the first Neptune bombers to be flown in Australia.



In Korea, Fl.-Lt. Cooney carried out 138 missions in Meteor jets. He returned from Korea about eight weeks ago. Recently he cut short his leave and returned to duty because of a shortage of jet instructors at Williamtown R.A.A.F. Base. Married only seven months, Fl.Lt. Cooney's wife (formerly Miss Zonia Hutcherson, a nursing sister of Cronulla) is an air hostess and was in Canada at the time of her husband's tragic death. Many of the elder generation of Kempsey and Macleay folk have extended their deepest sympathy to Mr. and Mrs. T. F. Cooney in the loss of their son, and to Mrs. Peter Cooney in the loss of her husband.

Recommendation: Private Winterford has served as a National Serviceman since 30 June 1965, and with 6th Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment, in Vietnam since June 1966. He was a section machine gunner until he was wounded during operations in Phuoc Tuy Province in July 1966. On 25 July 1966, during an action between "C" Company and a Company of Viet Cong, Private Winterford engaged two enemy machine guns which were accurately engaging the Company, with his own machine gun. Exercising excellent fire control, he quickly succeeded in neutralising the enemy guns. When an attack was mounted on the right flank of his platoon position, Private Winterford used his machine gun to such devastating effect that the enemy were forced to withdraw. Shortly after, whilst still engaging enemy, Private Winterford was seriously wounded in the left arm and his machine gun destroyed. Whilst obviously in great pain and suffering loss of blood, and though still under enemy fire, he conducted himself in such a courageous manner as to set an example and inspire those fighting with him. This display of professional skill and of his personal courage throughout the action was in the highest tradition of service, and reflects great credit upon himself, his Regiment and the Australian Army.

William Joseph Winterford, born 02Jun1945 at Brisbane, Qld; served as a National Serviceman with RAInfy Corps; Vietnam service with 6RAR 06Jun-29Aug1966.

William Edward James Eames, was born 21 February 1904 at Melbourne, Victoria. He was appointed Cadet-Midshipman (P.N.F.) on 1 January 1918 and entered the Royal Australian Naval College from where he graduated in 1921 and was awarded the King's Gold Medal. His appointment with the RAN was terminated on transfer to the Royal Navy on 31 December 1921. He served as a Midshipman on HMS Hood on its world cruise 1923-24 and later in 1936, as a Lieutenant Commander, he was captain of HMS Sandpiper, the smallest of the river gunboats in China. On 6 September 1938 the Japanese attacked the Sandpiper at Changsha on the Xiang River and although damaged, there were no casualties. Lieutenant Commander Eames then assumed the role of Consul and made arrangements for all Europeans to leave the area. He was recognised for his service with an early promotion to Commander.

During World War II Commander Eames was drafting commander at the RN Barracks at Devonport where he implemented mobilisation plans; Executive Officer of the aircraft carrier, HMS Argus; from early 1941 until September 1942 he commanded escort groups in the North Atlantic including on the destroyer, HMS Veteran 6 July 1941 to 19 August 1942; from September 1942 to June 1943 he served on the Admiralty staff as advisor on convoy escorts; participated in a delegation to Washington; and from July 1943 until war's end he commanded escort groups in the Atlantic and Mediterranean including on the sloop, HMS Pheasant 20 January - December 1944.

Post World War II some of his appointments included with the Admiralty and in Malta and he was also Naval Attache to Belgium and the Netherlands 1949-54. Commander Eames retired in 1954. He was recognised with an award of a Distinguished Service Cross on 23 January 1942, a Netherlands Orange Order in 1951 and made an Officer of the Order of the British Empire on 5 June 1952 in the Queen's Birthday Honours. William Eames died on 27 April 1967.

1297 Thomas Stawell Hutchings, Commonwealth Army Medical Corps (Victoria), departed as Corporal and served in the Boer War. As a member of the Army reserves he was promoted to L/Sergeant and then to Sergeant on 1 April 1902. On 5 February 1907 he was appointed Captain in the Army Medical Corps (Vic) as a supernumerary and brought onto the fixed establishment on 22 March 1907.

Thomas passed the final qualifying examination of the Pharmacy Board in April 1901. Then in December 1906 he was conferred with a Bachelor of Medicine degree from the University of Melbourne. On 18 January 1910 he married Margaret Jamieson M.B., B.S. at Scots Church, Melbourne and set up a medical practice at Euroa. Unfortunately, he met with a fatal accident and died on 20 January 1914 at the age of 37. He was returning by rail from Queensland when apparently he fell from the train. At about 6 o'clock in the morning the driver of a goods train found his body lying on the tracks at Breadalbane near Goulburn in New South Wales badly mutilated and with the right leg cut off.

It is interesting to note that his father, Thomas Hutchings, was a former councillor (1881-96) and president (1886-87) of the Shire of Stawell and no doubt that is why his son was named Thomas Stawell Hutchings.




