Several mints have been identified by Price as issuing staters without letters or symbols. While they all have some similarity it is the obverse with its characteristic hair style that fits closest to Price 164-168 (uncertain M acedonian mint) although a stater from this area with symbols or letters has not been previously published. Theobverse die is very similar to H (PI.25) in Troxell. A quarter stater was issued from the same series (Price 169A) without letters and or symbol and this suggests the possibility of a similar stater belonging to the same series.

A rare gold stater of the Alexander type struck in the name of Demetrios. Upon the death of Perdikkas in 320 BC , Demetrios' father Antigonos I tried to regain control of Alexander's empire. To this end, Demetrios laid siege to a number of cities. An alliance betw een Seleukos, Ptolemy, Lysimachos, and Kassander, however, defeated Demetrios and his father in 301 BC at Ipsos. Demetrios soon allied himself with Seleukos, who granted him lands in Cilicia. It was at this time that mints at Tarsos and Salamis in Cyprus
began striking Alexander staters in the name of Demetrios as King. In 294 $B C$, Demetrios lost Cilicia, but regained control of $M$ acedonia, where the minting of his Alexander staters continued until circa 290. In 285, after a futile attempt to recover his father's territories in Asia, he surrendered at last to Seleukos, who hospitably encouraged the once-great general to drink himself to death.

This coin is normally known as an issue of the Lydian king Croesus. Throughout the ancient world he was known for his legendary wealth, and it is therefore not surprising to find these most ancient of silver coins associated with this king. The lion is the paramount symbol of royalty and as such was appropriate for his Lydian kingdom. According to H erodotus, the Lydians were the first to strike gold and silver coins, but the numismatic evidence is not fully compatible with this statement. C arradice suggests that this coin is unlikely to have been minted in the lifetime of King Croesus and is of the type he calls late Croeseid (c. 510-500). H ow ever Sear assigns them to Croesus c. 560-546 B.C. The issue represents the introduction of the world's first bimetallic coinage, gold and silver pieces based on a stater of pure metal weighing about 10.8 grams. This was the initial phase of relatively short duration as shortly after the gold was reduced in weight to about 8 grams for a stater and the silver siglos of just over 5 grams replaced the silver stater. This is an historic and important silver coin from the earliest period of coinage. From the style of this example C arradice assigns the issue to late in the 6th century B.C.

The ancient city of Zeugma, was founded in 300 B.C. by Seleukos $N$ ikator, one of the generals of the Alexander the Great. At that time the city was named after the general and called " Seleukia on the Euphrates." The population of the city was approximately 80 000. In 64 B.C. Zeugma was conquered and ruled by Rome and with this shift the name of the city was changed to Zeugma in Greek meaning " bridge-passage." During R oman rule, the city became a regional centre, as the city of $Z$ eugma was on the silkroad connecting Antioch to China with its own quay on the river Euphrates. In 256 A.D. Z eugma was destroyed by the Sasanian King, Sapur I and his invasion was so devastating so that $Z$ eugma was not able to recover for many years. In the summer of 2000, this city one of the great frontier cities of the Roman Empire, all but disappeared under the flood waters of a dam. The Turkish government over the past twenty years had built a series of dams on the Euphrates river. This coin an issue towards the end of the city's importance is countermarked with an eagle, which significance is unknown. Several examples of this coinage are known with this countermark.

The inclusion of this type of Athenian imitations in the Samaria hoard, establishes the existance of a local mint (possibly Gaza or Ascalon [N umismatic Chronicle 1996, pps 1-9, on a hoard of 31 coins of this type found at Ascalon], or even a Samaritan mint) striking this coinage for local acceptance and to supplement the distinctive local coinage of Samaria. The hoard was buried about 346-5 B.C. and thus the chronological implications indicate this issue to be prior to that date.

The anchor was previously depicted on the coins of Alexander Jannaeus and Herod used this design to emphasize his role as the successor to the H asmonaean kings. It is also probable that Herod depicted the anchor to manifest his special interest in the coastal cities and in maritime trade. M ost numismatists agree that the galley symbolizes the construction of the harbour at C aesarea in 10 B.C. The coin is quite rare and obviously struck for a short time only. Its use of a maritime theme on both sides reflects this as one of H erod's major achievements in his reign. The last coin is the first coin issued by a Jewish ruler for use by Jews with a graven image upon it. The eagle is said to represent the golden bird King H erod placed above the entrance to the Jerusalem Temple. A most important group of this ruler.

These were widely available in Jerusalem and well known for their true weight and good silver. It is also believed that the " thirty pieces of silver" paid to Judas consisted of these Tyre shekels.
