This coin comes from an important hoard of Greek gold staters from the time of the M ithradatic War (88-86 B.C.). They were issued by M ithradates VI of Pontus who used the design of the famous issues two centuries earlier of Lysimachos. These staters with the head of Alexander the Great linked him to Alexander, history's greatest conqueror. At the age of 18, M ithradates embarked on a career of conquest, bringing most of the lands around the Black Sea under his control. These policies brought him into conflict with Rome and he consequently tried to liberate the East from Rome and quickly defeated the local garrisons and massacred every Roman citizen in Asia (some 80,000 in one night). Athens welcomed him as a liberator, but the Roman response came in 87 B.C. The Consul Sulla and five legions captured Athens and pursued M ithradates back to Asia M inor. M ithradates was fined 2000 talents ( 600,000 gold staters) and returned to Pontus. These gold staters were probably struck during his campaign in Thrace in late 88 to early 87 B.C., to pay his mercenary soldiers. Three cities struck these coins. Alternatively the view has been put forward suggesting that these coins were issues by Brutus in the Civil War of 44-42 B.C. and was published in Celator January 2000 (pp. 22-24). This identification may prove to be the correct interpretation.

Completing his expeditions to the outer limits of A sia M inor, Alexander the Great led his army westward late in 331 BC. The metropolis of Babylon was surrendered by its satrap, M azaios, whom Alexander rewarded with the local governorship. Alexander made Babylon his royal seat, and there established one of his most important mints, from which a large quantity of regular 'Alexandrine' or 'imperial' coinages were struck, including the impressive dekadrachms of circa $327 / 6 \mathrm{BC}$. In addition to the 'imperial' coinages, Babylon also produced a substantial group of local coinages, some of which initially bore the name of M azaios. But after M azaios' death in 328 B.C. the issue of silver 'lion staters' continued in at least three smaller denominations, all with a seated Baal on the obverse and a standing lion on the reverse. The staters initially were struck to the weight of the Attic tetradrachm, but eventually were reduced to the lighter Persic standard of the Babylonian shekel. Though initiated under M azaios, both the gold and the silver coinages were produced for decades afterwards, with the final silver coins probably being struck circa 288/7 BC under Seleukos I.

An exceptional military issue struck by the dictator Sulla in the East as imperator without reference to senatorial authorization. In his early career Sulla served Rome in many capacities, including the arrest of the renegade King Jugurtha in Numidia and at the other end of the M editerranean officiating at the first negotiations R ome held with Parthia. H owever, it was not until he reached his 50 s that his period of great achievement began. As an aspiring general and politician, Sulla found ample opportunity in Italy during the Social War (91-89 B.C.) and in Greece and the East during the First M ithridatic War (88-84 B.C.) and its aftermath. However, on more than one occasion Sulla's interests clashed with other equally ambitious Romans, not the least of whom was his elder C.M arius. Sulla had amassed experience, power and a fortune in war booty, which in 83 B.C. he used to finance his invasion of Italy, ostensibly to liberate Rome from the legions loyal to the memory of $M$ arius. Though $M$ arius was long dead, his party held firm control until, with the help of younger men such as Crassus and Pompey, Sulla toppled the M arian regime by force of arms. After defending Rome from the Samnites at the battle of the Colline Gate in 82 B.C. and mopping up the remaining $M$ arians in the West, Sulla's dictatorship seemed secure, even though M ithradates was again on the warpath in Asia. He was finaly defeated by agents of Sulla in 81 B.C. M arius was a radical reformer who tried to break the traditional power of the Senate and the wealthy families in Rome; Sulla opposed this and fought to re-establish the old order. $N$ eedless to say, the upheavals in both directions were enormously violent and socially disruptive, and in the process both M arius and Sulla earned reputations for their ruthlessness. Sulla alone is credited with executing some 90 senators and 2,600 equestrians. In 79 B.C. he reluctantly forfeited the dictatorship, and a year later he died whileliving on his estates in Campania. Even though Sulla normally rejected the usual practice of paying most of the state's annual expenses in new coin, he was none the less responsible for a great amount of coinage.
