An important issue struck during the Carthaginian War c.310-306 B.C. Jenkins notes that only one obverse die was used for this symbol and four reverse dies these with some muling with other obverse dies utilising other symbols. The financing of Agathokles' war with the Carthaginians was provided by a series of three electrum denominations, 50, 25 and 10 litrai. Only the 50 litrai was produced in enough quantity to actually play a significant role in the war's financial operations. The gold content of the 50 litrai varies from 70% for the first issue to 30% for the later issues (examples of this die averaged 50%). This probably reflects a lack of booty from the campaign needed to provide the necessary bullion to finance the expedition. The choice of Apollo/tripod type proclaims Agathokles' devotion to his patron god.

This coinage was struck within the first half century of true coinage and is the successor to the weighed but unmarked electrum nuggets. These crude types evolved almost immediately although attempts to identify the mint of this coinage are mostly conjectural. However this weight standard is common to Miletus and Lydia and sometimes called 'Phoenican' which circulated in southern Ionia and Caria. Several other examples have been sold in recent times. The NFA example above is from similar if not the same dies as our coin.

Estiot asserts that this remarkable coin is based on the final issues at Tripolis by Aurelian since it contained the exact reverse legend and type (cf.MIR pl.143 384d). The other known authentic example is in the Hermitage in St. Petersburg and its reverse die is linked to this issue. Estiot identified those features of the false reverse dies which make their identification possible, the TB P is reverted to TR P and there is no pellet on the reverse on the false coins. The present coin, however still retains the TB P and pellet, making it the second known authentic specimen. The forgeries are copies of this and the Hermitage coin or of another unpublished example. The lot also comes with a ticket indicating purchase from CNG. Sybaris was founded by the Achaeans about 720 B.C. It was the richest and most important of the Greek colonies in Italy until its destruction by Croton in 510 B.C. The city was rebuilt in 453 B.C. with the aid of the Poseidonians but was again destroyed five years later by Croton. In 443 B.C. with the help of the Athenians the city arose again but its name was now changed to Thurium. This later city survived into Roman times and became a Roman city with its name changed to Copia. Today the archaeological ruins of all three different named cites can be seen by the interested tourist, each city's remains sits one upon the other.

Although ten tetradrachms of this city were present in the Randazzo Hoard, only four were of this type and all came from the first obverse and first reverse dies of this series. The reverse die shows a breaking up and a similar example with the same degree of die-breaking occurs on Plate XX No.1q in RN 1956. Herzfelder in his extensive study on this coinage knew of 19 examples of this coin from these dies of which 9 were from the same state of die deterioration as this example from the Randazzo Hoard (he lists the references of all the then known examples). Many of the examples known are in public collections. For all dies Herzfelder was only able to find 46 coins of this type. Together with the four from Randazzo only 50 surviving examples are known today. The seated figure on the reverse presents problems of interpretation, because in the course of the series his iconography varies; usually he is a bearded mature man, but sometimes a beardless youth. Six followed by Herzfelder, identified him as the heroised founder locastus, son of King Aeolus of the Lipari Islands, who died as a result of a snake bite and whose tomb became the site of the Chalcidian-Messenian colony of Rhegium.

This enigmatic series of coins which were dated far too early by Head (who had no hoard information) were probably struck when Demetrius Poliorcetes 'liberated' Thebes, or during the decade that followed. The Talanta (1948) hoard (CH III, 31), with a burial date of c. 280 B.C, would point to a minting date for these coins of circa 300 B.C. They are almost never encountered well centered on both sides and sharply struck at the same time, which also speaks for their late date. Head dated them to 387-374 B.C. The city of Heraclea, situated at the head of the Latmic Gulf about fifteen miles east of Miletus, was best known for a cave which was regarded as the tomb of Endymion. Heraclea joined with other Ionian and Aeolian cities in the issue of 'stephanaphori' around 160-150 B.C., its issue being much smaller. 

The piece has extensive traces of an old ink collection number at base of tablet coming once from a museum or private collection. The oldest known written language, cuneiform, first used by the ancient peoples of the Near East over 5000 years ago, is composed of a series of wedge-shaped incisions made with a sharpened reed stylus. This script was adopted by all the major civilizations of Mesopotamia for recording their distinct languages, including the Sumerians, Akkadians, Assyrians and Babylonians. Clay tablets were the preferred media for everyday writing because they could either be easily recycled or, if a permanent record was required, fired in a kiln and preserved. The earliest recorded inscriptions are not myths or histories, but rather banal economic transactions and accounting documents. Later, one of the most famous written works of the ancient world, Hammurabi's code, was recorded in the cuneiform script. While these marks may appear obscure and mysterious to our eyes, scholars have made much progress in deciphering cuneiform after discovering inscriptions on the Behistun Rock, a cliff in western Iran. Much like the Rosetta Stone, the Behistun Inscription contained the same text written in three different languages (Persian, Babylonian, and Elamite), all of which utilized the cuneiform system of writing. Due to the resemblance of these languages to modern ones, scholars were able to crack the code. This terracotta tablet reveals just how intricate a system of writing cuneiform was. In the hands of a talented scribe, a remarkable amount of information could be squeezed into a relatively small space and yet still remain legible. Both the front and back of this tablet have been written on, containing a total of thirteen lines of text. Like most tablets that survive, the text relates to administrative matters.


